Honoring Modern Pioneers

The Salt Lake Pioneer Chapter recently honored two modern pioneers and one historic pioneer. The modern pioneers were Pope John Paul II and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Pope John Paul II was honored for his pioneering efforts in Poland, in bringing down the Berlin Wall, and in aiding the poor. Standing in for the Pope to receive a special framed certificate was Father Elliott from the Cathedral of the Madeline in Salt Lake.

Meeting of Chapter Presidents and Presidents-Elect

Sixty Chapter presidents and presidents-elect gathered April 16th at the National Headquarters to voice their opinions about issues confronting the organization.

Leadership

President J. Todd Olsen encouraged the leaders to nominate strong candidates for area vice presidents, and suggested names for a new Executive Manager. He introduced the leaders to the new monthly electronic

newsletter, and asked chapters to share their successes and good ideas by the end of each month by sending information and pictures to the newly-selected Editor, Reed Farnsworth at MSSUP@Hotmail.com or Reed@Farnsworth.us.

A list of the email addresses of chapter leaders to receive the newsletter should be sent as soon as possible to Reed by each chapter.

Pioneer Magazine Endowment Fund

Kent Lott (Pioneer Magazine Publisher, Past President) reported on the progress of the Pioneer Magazine Endowment fund (Goal: \$150,000. Donation Total: \$75,000). He challenged each chapter officer to give a gift subscription to the Pioneer Magazine by October 1st of this year. Kent also updated leaders to the organization financial review by Marion Wittwer and Ted Davis, who found that funds are being handled properly. Recommended changes in the formatting of the monthly financial reports and the procedure for handling checks to the Pioneer Magazine are now being implemented.

Encampment and Landmarks

L. Stewart Radmall (National Director of Trails and Landmarks), referring to the National Encampment, said a new registration form is in the Pioneer Magazine with corrected prices and tours. An SUP plaque will be placed on a building at Mormon Hollow, in which Joseph Smith preached.

Settlement Canyon Chapter Recognized

Grant E. Barton (President-Elect) highlighted great work by the Settlement Canyon Chapter. The chapter provides the manpower and the displays for a City-financed pioneer museum, including a complete Conestoga Wagon, handcarts, buggies, cream separator, and many other valuable heirlooms from the pioneer era. The facility also provides the board with a place to meet. The chapter also has an on-going project of helping maintain the Tooele City cemetery.

Membership Growth

Grant highlighted the growth of the Sons of Utah Pioneers. President Lott' Goal last year was 200 new members. The actual number of new members in 2004 exceeded the goal, and totaled 221.

Self-Study Commission

Grant also introduced the idea that many organizations periodically perform an audit of their mission, by-laws and operations. He proposed such a Self-Study Commission for the SUP, with a majority of the representatives being drawn from current or recent chapter leaders. The commission will meet semi-monthly for approximately six months and make recommendations to the National Board. Several of the assembled chapter leaders individually expressed support for the idea, then voted unanimously in favor of it.

Nominations for candidates to the commission should be directed by the end of May to grantebarton@yahoo.com

The bulk of the meeting was turned over to the chapter presidents and presidents-elect, who expressed some feelings about elections and the scope of the organization. These items will be scrutinized by the Self-Study Commission. Much discussion revolved around current Executive Manager Frank Brown. In the end, the chapter leaders voted that Frank should continue to fill out his present assignment until the end of the year.

RECOMMENDATION FOR EXECUTIVE MANAGER

Recommendations are being sought for a part-time (15-20 hours/wk) executive manager. Duties include:

- 1) **Supervision** of the administrative assistant, a janitor and volunteers
- 2) **Training** of new leaders in groups and as individuals
- 3) Communication: Agendas, minutes, correspondence, email & telephone
- 4) **Finances:** Keep records, pay bills, rent building, secure magazine ads
- 5) **Materials:** Print brochures & certificates, prepare awards

The successful candidate should live in the Salt Lake Valley, be a congenial team worker, have administrative and computer skills, and be a self-starter.
