
Pioneers were honored, and **Elder Marlin K. Jensen** (below) reminded us of the great sacrifice and devotion of the handcart pioneers.

Chapter President's Council Approves Two New Policies. All was not play at this year's Convention. Two meetings of the chapter presidents were held. The formal announcement of the change in Life Membership Policy was made by Jay M. 2006 National President-Elect. Beginning with the 2007 dues year, no annual National dues will be charged to Life Members. The Pioneer magazine will continue to be sent to all Life Members as long as they live. Annual members were encouraged to become Life Members this Fall as they renew their memberships. In return for \$300, they will receive a beautiful ruby centered Life Membership pin, their name engraved on the wall of the Legacy Hall in the Headquarters Building, a copy of the PIONEER magazine throughout their life, and a copy of the Pioneer Saga produced by Robert Cundick. A goal was set by the Executive Council to increase the life members by 120 between now December 31, 2007.

Another welcomed proposal was presented

and approved relating to the Chapter **Award program**. The current program that gives awards by size of chapter and overall points earned will be replaced by awards in seven categories with distinct criteria for each category. The award year was changed from a fiscal year to a calendar year, with the first year being 18 months long, June 30, 2006-December 31, 2007. **National** Program Directors and the Executive Manager will be in charge of the categories. Additional information will be provided the The January Area Council Training meetings will focus on the new program.

Symphonic Premiere in Salt Lake Sponsored by the SUP & DUP A new symphonic work "Fresh Courage Take" will premier in Salt Lake November 3, 2006, at 7 p.m., in the Bountiful Regional Conference Center. This premiere is being co-sponsored by the Sons of Utah Pioneers and the Daughters of Dr. Pond, distinguished Utah Pioneers. Professor of Music at UVSC, has written the symphonic suite for orchestra, chorus, and narrators commemorating the Willie and Martin Handcart Companies. The suite consists of eight movements: (1) Overture: to Zion, (2) The Trek, (3) Bring Them In!, (4) Early Snow, Cold, Diminishing Supplies, (5) Across the Frozen Sweetwater, (6) The Cove, the Ridge: Becoming Acquainted with Him in Our Extremities. (7) The Rescue and Embraced in Welcoming **Descendants** of the Willie and Martin Handcart Companies and their Rescuers will be recognized at this special event that comes within six days of the 150th

Anniversary of the arrival of the Willie Handcart Company into the Valley. Narrators will include Marvin Payne, Carol Mekita, and National SUP President Grant Barton and his wife Marilyn. We suggest a minimum age of 8 years for children.

Sugar House Chapter hosts Exciting Pioneer Handcart Re-enactment. On
September 26, 150 years since the first
handcarts rolled into Salt Lake Valley, a reenactment of the event was held. Over **100**



handcarts and hundreds of walkers walked from This is the Place Monument to the downtown Convention Center, with a stop at the Salt Lake 10th Ward historic building. The **Nauvoo Band** led the way. The celebration concluded with remarks



from Elder Marlin K. Jensen (above, with

NSSUP President, Grant Barton, and two participants dressed as Brigham Young, and one of Brigham's wives), church historian The spirit was high as participants waved their white handkerchiefs to those who came to the street to watch the parade. The Sugar House chapter sponsored the event. Several officers and other chapter members rallied to the call and came dressed in their pioneer costume to carry the United States flag or just "pull and push."

Salt Lake City and Twin Peaks Chapters Trek to Ibapah, Utah On September 7, 2006, 44 members of the Salt Lake City and Twin Peaks Chapters took an eleven hour trek to the remote Tooele County town of Ibapah. The tour was conducted by Lavon Day, President of the Salt Lake City Chapter. He and his wife spent 18 months in this town in 1970 helping members of the Goshute Indian tribe develop a welding business that made cattle guards, pickup racks, water tanks, and other similar items. This business continued to operate until the mid 1990's. The tour left Salt Lake early Thursday morning. Tour members learned about the Kennecott Copper Mines, Saltair Resort, Salt Flats and its automobile racing events, and the military area where preliminary tests were made in 1945 leading up to the atomic bombs that were dropped over Japan. The group continued through Wendover and finally into Nevada and back into Utah and the town of Ibapah.

This area was traversed by the Pony Express in 1860, the telegraph in 1861, stage coaches and mail routes. In the 1850's and 1860's, livestock was grazed in the area and ranches established. This was followed by Mormon missionaries in 1874 who gathered the Goshute's together, purchased land, deeded it to the Indians and taught them modern methods of farming. The settlement was originally called "Deep Creek" for the name of the local creek. It was changed to Ibapah,

an anglicized version of the Goshute word that means "white clay water", descriptive of the river water heavy with fine white clay particles. The area boomed for a certain period of time, particularly during the mining activities at Gold Hill and even supported a newspaper called the "Deep Creek Critic". The area currently is inhabited by descendents of the early settlers and the Goshute Indians who live on a reservation of approximately 110,000 acres. Lavon was able to add much color to the tour because of his personal connection to the area. The group enjoyed a dinner in Wendover before they headed home on I-80. A special thanks is given to Ray Baumgartner of the Twin Peaks Chapter for his contributions, and to Phyllis and Kyle Bateman, long time residents of Ibapah who hosted us during our tour and discussed the history of the area with us.

Brigham Young Chapter Speaker, Brent Ashworth. On September 21, over 110 members and spouses of the Brigham Young Chapter were treated to a look into artifacts dating to the Revolutionary War and the Founding Fathers and of the early LDS Church leaders owned by Brent Ashworth, noted historian and collector. Brent brought many examples of letters, books, and pictures that have significant history attached to them. He shared the contents of several original letters with the group that added insight into people who are part of our history.

Squaw Peak Chapter Speaker, Jay M. Smith, National President-Elect 2006. On September 20, over 60 members of the Squaw Peak Chapter enjoyed a dinner at the Noni International Building in the Provo River Bottoms and listened to our 2006 President-Elect share information about important changes occurring in the Sons of Utah Pioneer organization and how the SUP

Mission Statement can be implemented in each chapter. He shared personal stories of men and women who demonstrated pioneer values in their lives as Today's Pioneers, and how he and his wife try to creatively teach these values to his eleven children and 46 grandchildren, and growing numbers of great grandchildren. Jay hopes to attend many chapter meetings during his year as SUP National President to give encouragement to chapter leaders and members.
