

Dear SUP Associates:

Much attention has been given the handcart pioneers this year. It was at this time of year that the surviving Willie Company pioneers were finally brought into what was then called the Great Salt Lake City. We don't weary of hearing of their magnificent faith and unyielding courage. Our new SUP Historian, Richard Horsley, lent me a large book of their stories, among which was this heart-rending account of the **Osbornes**, a little English family in the Willie Company:

- **Pioneer family**: Daniel (35), Susannah (33), one son and three daughters
- **Conditions**: October 19th, Snowing, 4 ounces of flour/day each (Fathers giving their portions to their families rather than see them suffer)
- **Personal Loss**: Oct 19th (Ice Springs, Wyoming) Son little Daniel dies. (Three days later the rescue wagons arrive). Nov 1st (Near Fort Bridger) Father Daniel Sr. dies. Nov 5th: Wife Susanna dies in Echo Canyon (so close!)
- Salt Lake: The three orphaned Osborne girls taken into Bishop Silas Richard's home and raised as his own children. He describes their condition: "None of them were able to walk across the room without difficulty...their only clothing being some remnants of summer apparel...no shoes or woolen stockings...very feeble and required much care and attention." (Tell My Story, Too, Jolene S. Allphin, p. 107)

May we keep the memory of their sacrificing for their Faith in God alive in the next generations!

HISTORICAL SYMPOSIUM CELEBRATES HANDCART RESCUES

-- The Sons of Utah Pioneers Annual Historical Symposium was held at the National Headquarters Building on Saturday October 14. Over 150 SUP members and guests attended the afternoon symposium. Enjoying the new padded folding chairs that were recently purchased by supporting SUP members, those attending were treated to three scintillating and varied presentations by Dr. James B. Allen, DeVerl and Joan Byington, and Scott Lorimer. The theme of the **Rescues** was broadened to include the physical rescues of the beleaguered Saints, the second rescue by the Riverton, Wyoming Stake members in 1991-92 when they researched and did temple work for thousands of the handcart pioneers, their rescuers, and descendants, and the third composer, and **Scott and Dee Lorimer**, former Riverton, Wyoming Stake President and his wife.

The Sons of Utah Pioneers and Daughters of Utah Pioneers collaborated to support the presentation of the orchestral and chorale suite, Fresh Courage Take, presented at the Provo Tabernacle on October 27 and at the Bountiful Regional Center on November 3. With touching excerpts taken from the journals and reminiscing of handcart pioneers and rescuers, four narrators wove the pioneer story through the creative music composed by Marden Pond and performed by the Utah Valley State College Symphony Orchestra and Masterworks



which is occurring today thousands of our youth visit the Martin's Cove area and participate in re-enactment treks. The evening **dinner** was attended by over 130 members and friends and included two beautiful baritone solos by Cliff Cole, Impossible Dream, and Mountain Home and an inspiring address by Elder Robert F. Orton of the Second Quorum of Seventies. Three Today's Pioneers Awards were presented during the evening program to Eldred G. Smith Church Patriarch, and his wife, Hortense, Crawford Gates.

Chorale. Elder Roger Fluhman, an Area Authority Seventy, added poignant remarks the Bountiful Concert. In both presentations, an appreciative audience gave standing ovations to the composer and the performing artists. These concerts brought a fitting conclusion to the three activities sponsored by the Sons of Utah Pioneers and its chapters: the September 26 re-enactment of the handcarts entry into the valley (see October Trail Marker), the Historical Symposium, and the Fresh Courage Take concerts. Added to these performances was

the successful distribution of over **1,000** gold, silver and bronze medallions honoring Martin's Cove. We will not soon forget the great legacy that we have received from these true pioneers 150 years ago.

The "Buy a Chair" Campaign a Tremendous Success -- The invitation to help buy new padded folding chairs for the SUP Headquarters Building was met with outstanding support. Over 350 chairs
