2005 ENCAMPMENT WRAP-UP


Three hundred SUP delegates and partners dined sumptuously, were entertained with a stage play and professional vocal and piano artistry, heard stimulating messages from U.S. Congressman Mike Fitzpatrick, William Devlin (past President of the Urban Family Council of Philadelphia) and the Philadelphia Stake Presidency. A highlight was the election of Jay Smith as 2006 President-Elect and several Area Vice Presidents, while the wives enjoyed a meeting with historians Richard and Diane Turley.

The awards luncheon concluded the conference, with keynote speaker Richard Buschman, professor at Columbia University, who spoke about personal aspects of the Prophet Joseph Smith's life. Plaques and certificates were awarded for outstanding chapter performance.

In addition to the Encampment itself, delegates chose between several tour options, including historic LDS Church sites from Vermont to Ohio, such as Palmyra, Kirtland, Harmony, "Mormon Hollow" and the Susquehanna River. A highlight was to visit Joseph Smith's birthplace on the 200th Anniversary of his birth.

Patriotic sites included the Gettysburg, The Liberty Bell and Constitution Hall. Despite a driving rainstorm, Independence Hall filled with SUP members on July 8th, the exact anniversary of the first public reading of the

Declaration of Independence. It was a lively event as gallery guests included many people in period costume voicing their opinions both for and against independence (guests were encouraged to participate too.

JAY M. SMITH, JR. VOTED 2006 PRESIDENT-ELECT

President-Elect **JAY M. SMITH, JR.** was born in Denver, Colorado, and grew up in Denver, Salt Lake City, and Boise. He attended Boise Jr. College, BYU, and Stanford University, where he received a PhD in Business with an emphasis of Accounting. He married **JENAVEE CORDON** in the Idaho Falls Temple in 1952. After earning his CPA certificate, he worked in public accounting for four years before returning to teach at BYU. In addition to teaching at BYU, he taught at Stanford University, the University of Minnesota, and the University of Hawaii. He retired as Professor of Accounting from BYU in 1995 after 28 years of teaching at BYU.

Jay has served the Church in many capacities including Bishop, Stake President, High Councilor, Family History Specialist, and Stake Young Men's President. He served as Mission President in the Maryland Baltimore Mission from 1997-2000. He with his wife served as the Provo Temple President and Matron from 2001-2004. He and his wife have 11 children, 45 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren. The Smiths currently live in the Oak Hills 4th Ward near the Provo Temple. Jay loves the temple and the family history work that supports it. He is currently president of two family associations and is actively involved in research and publishing histories of his ancestors.

Todd Olsen's father NOLAN drove from Nauvoo to Salt Lake City during the centennial celebration, the oxen were from that original centennial trek (photo to left). Our third entry in the parade was our PRESIDENT ELECT GRANT BARTON and his wife MARYLYN riding in a convertible waving to the crowd of over a hundred thousand people.

A revised Sons of Utah Pioneers mission statement was proposed by the **SELF-STUDY COMMISSION** and approved by the National Board:

"The mission of the Society of the Sons of Utah Pioneers is to preserve memory and heritage of early pioneers of the Utah Territory. We honor the pioneers for their Faith in God; Devotion to Family; Loyalty to Church and Country; Hard work and service to others; Courage in adversity; Personal integrity; and unyielding determination.

"The Society also honors present-day pioneers worldwide in many walks of life, who exemplify these same qualities of character. It is further intended to teach these same qualities to the youth who will be tomorrow's pioneers."

MEMBER ACHIEVEMENTS

FORMER NSSUP PRESIDENT KARLO MUSTONEN, 77, died Wednesday, August 3, 2005 of pulmonary fibrosis. His funeral was held at in Logan on Monday, August 8th. Karlo, was born in Finland, came to America in 1954, was fluent in nine languages, worked in the Utah State University library until his retirement. Karlo was also active in

the boy scouts receiving the Silver Beaver Award and the Vigil award in the Order of the Arrow. He was always helping those less fortunate and touched many young men's lives.

The project will be done in conjunction and cooperation with BYU-IDAHO, which has already compiled an extensive database of obituaries. As the photographs are produced each one will be married to the appropriate obituary and will then be available on the university website to researchers and genealogists. The project is under the direction of chapter member JAMES DOWNEY, who serves as chairman of their family history committee. He is being assisted by GAIL CAZIER, a former chapter president, and by many of the chapter members who have signed up to work in a particular cemetery. It is anticipated that the project may take some time to complete, as there are literally thousands of headstones and markers to be recorded.
