37 CHAPTERS REPRESENTED AT CHAPTER PRESIDENT COUNCIL MEETING

Over sixty leaders of the Sons of Utah Pioneers gathered at the Headquarters Building on Saturday April 22 to attend the first Annual Spring Council Meeting. Chapter Presidents from as far away as Harmony, Pennsylvania and Mesa, Arizona joined with Utah and Idaho leaders to receive instructions and give counsel to the National Officers. Only six chapters were not able to have a President or President Elect at the meeting. The breakout sessions addressed five topics: Life Memberships, Renewals, Recruitment and Reactivation, the TrailMarker monthly newsletter, and the Annual Chapter Awards Program. Excellent ideas were suggested that will be considered by the National Board in future meetings.

A highlight of the meeting was presentations made during the luncheon of three **Top Recruiter Awards** and two **Modern Pioneer**



Awards. The recruiter awards went to **Homer LeBaron** who recruited 18 new members in The
Mountain Valley Chapter (Heber Valley), **Don Munk**who led the team who recruited **30** members to the
Sevier Valley Chapter and **Jay M. Smith** who
recruited 5 members to the Brigham Young Chapter,
two who were in their 40s. The Modern Pioneer
awards went to **Wayne Lynn**, President of the





Centerville Chapter who was a leader in the LDS Church Curriculum Planning and the Indian Seminary Program, and Mark Ricks, the LDS Stake President who led the Teton Flood relief effort in the 1980s and has served in the Idaho Legislature and as Area Vice President for the SUP. President Grant Barton announced a new Top Recruiter Award for the period January 1 to August 1, 2006. (See boxed announcement below).

A second **2006 Chapter Presidents Council** meeting will be held in conjunction with the National Convention to be held in Heber Valley, September 14-16, 2006.

Son and Grandson of SUP Member Honored by National Football Foundation, Utah Chapter. Daniel Benson, son of Ralph and Louise Benson and grandson of Dell Madsen (Salt Lake City Chapter) was the highest rated among students given awards. He had been named by both Utah newspapers to the football first team All-State and was voted by his team members as the "Most Inspirational" and the "Best Student Athlete." With a 4.0 GPA, Daniel was ranked #1 in his graduating class at Bountiful High School, where he was the Sterling Scholar in math. In addition to many activities in drama and other leadership, he served as student body president. He will be an outstanding "Pioneer of Tomorrow."

The Cotton Mission Chapter, in a special chapter meeting in April, has awarded five scholarships to "Tomorrow's Pioneers" – students from the high schools near them.

Each student received \$1,000 – \$500 from the SUP and a \$500 matching grant from the Presidential Freedom Scholarship Program. In addition, five fifth grade students were winners of \$20 each in the Chapter's pioneer essay contest, writing about their own pioneer ancestors.

The Sevier Valley Chapter has arranged with KSVC Radio Station to publicize SUP activities and events on their "Perspectives" program each month – Good publicity for our organization! The chapter is providing a display case for recently discovered early Sevier County maps, to be housed in the county offices. The monthly chapter newsletter "Trail Bits" highlights one or two chapter members each month in brief biographies, which help other members become better acquainted.
