We are announcing a new program, requested by several Chapters, to remember respected SUP members who have passed away by having their names placed on the **walls** of the National Building with their **histories** placed in the SUP Library. The "In Memoriam" Program described elsewhere in this newsletter provides for this service. A **form** to be used for chapters, members, and family to remember their deceased friends is included in this newsletter. The cost per name will be **\$35**.

YOUTH PROGRAMS SUCCESSFUL

Hundreds of High School, Middle School, and Grade School students wrote essays, pioneer biographies or applied for scholarships this year, and participation in these programs is on the increase. Preliminary information indicates a **72% increase** in Chapter Scholarship Programs, a 44% increase in Chapter Essay Programs, with two Chapters sponsoring a Biography Writing program. Eight Chapters conducted **both** a Scholarship and an Essay-writing program, an increase of 300%!

There are three Youth Programs: 1) Grade School students write 250 word essays about pioneer life, 2) High School students write a 1200 word biography of a pioneer ancestor. 3) Graduating High School seniors who have overcome serious obstacles and exemplify pioneer values can apply for college scholarships. A majority of our 46 Chapters sponsor at least one of these Youth Programs each year in local schools.

The Essay and Pioneer Biography Programs work best when SUP Chapter members approach school administrators early in the school year to schedule the essay or biography writing as an integral part of the school curriculum. These programs fit nicely into Utah history curricula in the 4th and 7th grades in Utah schools. We should begin planning now for approaching schools in the Fall.

Your hard work in these programs is fulfilling our Mission to Teach Pioneer principles to our Youth. The most gratifying of all is what these youth have learned and will <u>remember</u>! Thanks to you all!


Essay Winners. At the May meeting of the Jordan River Temple Chapter, President Grant Ivie and Community Relations Director Louis

FROM CHAPTER NEWSLETTERS

LEHI (Lehi, UT). Speaker Alvin Schow reminisced about playing on the old walls of Fort Lehi, about people fixing roads themselves when there were only two paved roads in town, and all about the Sugar Factory. The Chapter **trekked to Antelope Island** (largest of 10 islands in the Great Salt Lake, with deer, bobcats, coyotes, bison and elk). Coming up: In June, SUP members ride the **Thanksgiving Point Trolley** in the Lehi Roundup. In July, Howard Ault will speak and show **artifacts from Camp Floyd**.

LITTLE SALT LAKE (Parowan, UT). Lorraine Thompson spoke in April on **early Parowan pioneers** (Parowan was used as a jumping off site to colonize many other settlements – hence the name "Little Salt Lake"). Leon Matheson spoke in May on the history of Parowan, plus the Chapter awarded scholarships. In June, Garth Norman will present on the **archeology and petroglyphs** of the Parowan Gap. Historical note: Francis Whitney, first Parowan Sunday School Superintendent, **blew his big seashell** each Sunday for everyone to come to Sunday School.

<u>MILLS</u> (Salt Lake, UT). Welden Anderson, noted LDS Church photographer, showed examples of his work and gave tips on creating great photographs. Bob Davis, of Eugene Jelesnick's Band, entertained on the piano. Three scholarships were awarded. Coming up: Overnight bus trek to Castle Valley Pageant on August 3rd and 4th.

TAYLORSVILLE BENNION (South Salt Lake, UT). In April, Taylorsville-Bennion Chapter **celebrated their 30th anniversary! Elder Erin Call, Emeritus Seventy,** spoke on the Mexican **Mormon Colonies.** In May, the Scholarship winner was announced, with entertainment from Jolene Tanner and her singing group "*Just Friends*". Coming up: June: **Chapter handcart** in the Taylorsville Parade, June speaker **English Channel Swimmer** Richard Barnes. July: Annual Summer Picnic at Millrace Park. August: Annual Chapter Trek.

<u>SQUAW PEAK</u> (Orem, UT). Counterintelligence Special Agent Mike Ramsdell spoke in April on his experiences in the Soviet Union during the cold war. Chapter president, Steve Biesinger, an international businessman reminds us that the Lord suddenly brought the Berlin Wall down in December 1989, allowing modern pioneers to roll out democracy and freedom in all Eastern Bloc countries. In May, the Chapter toured the historical monuments and ruins in Parley's Hollow (Just north of the National Building). The Chapter has a well-developed 13member Board (Including a Chapter Photographer and a Historian).

<u>HURRICANE VALLEY</u> (Hurricane, UT). For several years, Wes Christiansen has promoted the **Pioneer Essay Writing program** in area 4th grades. In April, these essays were highlighted. Wes has placed the stories in the Hurricane Museum. In May, **TWO Chapter treks!** One to the **Grand Staircase Escalante** National Monument. The other, in 4-wheel drive vehicles, to the **Kodachrome Basin State Park** and the Pariah **movie set** and **ghost town**. JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE (South Jordan, UT). At the May meeting of the Jordan River Temple Chapter, noted Lecturer and Historian Dr. James B. Allen was the special speaker. Dr. Allen, former B.Y.U. Professor of History, has written **14 books** and has published more than **90 articles**. His power point presentation of the "Rescue of the Willie and Martin Handcart Companies" was very informative and inspiring. The Chapter also presented two first place Essay Contest winners.

<u>COTTON MISSION</u> (St. George, UT). The Spectrum & **Daily News** carried an article about the Cotton Mission Chapter, including a new monument the Chapter placed on a bluff between Southgate and Bloomington. The monument commemorates the large concrete navigation arrows placed around the country in the 1920s to guide commercial airline pilots to airports. St. George **Mayor Dan McArthur** was present.

SALT LAKE CITY (Salt Lake City, UT). **EIGHTY-SIX SCHOLARSHIPS** were awarded at a dinner at the Salt Lake Sheraton Hotel. Families and school administrators of each of the scholarship recipients were in attendance. National Public Relations Director, John Swallow, was the featured speaker. The event was organized by National Scholarship Chairman, **John Morgan**. **OGDEN PIONEER** (Ogden, UT). Over 80 members of the Ogden Pioneer chapter attended a monthly luncheon meeting on May 14. National President, Jay M. Smith, attended as a guest and briefly spoke. The speaker was chapter member and former NSSUP President, **Bill Critchlow**, who presented slides of over 60 **historical paintings** by **22 artists** that were commissioned for the **1976 bi-centennial** celebration under his direction. Funding for the project was aided by a grant from William Childs of R. C. Willey. The speaker gave **historical insights** as slides of the pictures were displayed.

TEMPLE FORK (Logan, UT). Conrad Dunn provided beautiful violin music and shared with members his recent experience in taking orchestra members to the 400 year celebration of the founding of Jamestown Virginia. The Chapter also **awarded scholarships** to John Summit (Who overcame a learning disability, serves on the debate team and **works with civic leaders in the Cache Valley Peer Court to help youth make better choices**), Melissa Guymon (who **worked in her single mom's day care** center and volunteers regularly at a retirement home), and Ted Nielsen (a student body president who volunteers at an elementary after-school program).

BOUNTIFUL (Bountiful, UT). Kevin Nield, Director of Bishop's Storehouses spoke on his assignments in Europe, the Philippines, Asia, the Pacific and Latin America. The winners of the annual Essay Contest were announced. The Essay Chapter contest involves nineteen elementary schools under the direction of Darrel Oborn. Each school had a first and second place winner. (\$50 and \$25 awards). <u>MAPLE MOUNTAIN</u> (Springville and Mapleton, UT). In April, 35 members and their spouses had dinner at the Springville Art Museum and then had a presentation by Director Vern Swanson on his recent book, *Dynasty of the Holy* <u>Grail.</u> In May, the chapter assembled at the **Crandall Historical Printing Museum** in downtown Provo and listened to inspiring stories of the history of printing and its effect on humanity. Replicas of the press that printed the **Gutenberg Bible**, the **Benjamin Franklin** press, and the **Grandin Press** in Palmyra that printed the Book of Mormon made the hands-on experience very informative and interesting.

<u>**CEDAR CITY</u>** (Cedar City, UT). Two \$2,000 scholarships were awarded by Chairman Ben Baldwin. Beautiful plaques will also be presented to the recipients High Schools. "IN MEMORIAM" Deceased Members of Sons of Utah Pioneers

Early Pioneers. A unique feature of the National Sons of Utah Pioneers National Building is the Pioneer <u>Memorialization Boards</u> on the walls of the Main Floor Wide Hallway. Over 6,000 names of pioneers who came to Utah before Statehood in 1896 have been placed on these boards by descendants. Biographies of these pioneers have been placed in the NSSUP Library.

Deceased Members of SUP: The National SUP Board has approved the addition of another set of boards on the North wall of the Lower Level Pioneer Hall. These will be referred to as the "In Memoriam" boards. The purpose of these boards is to provide a place where chapters, families or friends may formally remember Sons of Utah Pioneers and their spouses who have passed on to the "Chapter Eternal". The information on the form attached to this issue of the *Trail Marker* will be filed in the NSSUP Library along with any accompanying obituaries. These biographies will be available to library visitors and in the future will be placed on the SUP website. The cost of providing this service by the NSSUP will be \$35, the same cost charged for the memorialization of a head of a family.

This program was initially started in 2004, and several chapters have submitted names of deceased members to be honored in lieu of funeral flowers. These names will be the first ones included on the boards. The name of each person remembered will be engraved on an individual plate with the chapter initials, the birth year and the death year An index of the names with their board location will be maintained.

A picture of the deceased member of Sons of Utah Pioneers is encouraged with the submission of the "In Memoriam" form. We encourage chapters, family and friends to use these boards as a way of remembering individuals who have been affiliated with the Sons of Utah Pioneers during their lives.
