The sculptor, Stan Watts', rendition of this young girl epitomizes the youth who not only gave their lives for the gospel, but for the young people of today. This can be viewed at, "This Is The Place Heritage Park", immediately west of the main visitor's center in Salt Lake City.

A dedication of the new Mud Wall Monument was also made on May 7th in Tooele by the Settlement Canyon Chapter. Many thanks to those who participated in the preparation of this monument.

Congratulations to graduates! On May 7th, the Salt Lake Chapter, under the direction of John Morgan, awarded over 125 SUP scholarships to graduating students from selected high schools in the Salt Lake valley. Donations were gathered from a variety of sources to make this possible.

The Sons of Utah Pioneers has become a co-sponsor with Utah Pioneer Heritage Arts (UPHA), "a nonprofit organization which preserves and celebrates Utah pioneer heritage by creating artistic, educational and entertainment programs and events embodying people and stories from Utah's pioneer era, (1847-1869)". This is done through demonstration of arts such as pioneer dances, music, paintings, poetry, quilting, sculpturing, songwriting, storytelling drama, etc. Clive Romney, Executive Director of UPHA, works with a Board of Trustees and staff to implement programs in schools and public activities. Bodil was a nine year old child who walked in the Willie Handcart Company. She had been placed in charge of some of the younger children. As she returned from collecting sagebrush to burn she could go no further and froze to death. The monument was designed and created by Stan Watts, sculptor. Glen Davis offered an invocation, Paul Gates sang the music "Prayer of the Walking Child" by Dave Tinney. The remarks and dedicatory prayer was offered by Elder Earl Phippen (shown on left below with sculptor Stan Watts on right),

BRIGHAM YOUNG (Provo, Utah) Elliott Cameron and his committee selected nine young people to receive \$1,000 scholarships to the college or university of their choice. Those receiving the scholarships were required to exemplify character traits of true pioneers faith, courage, endurance, and family values. They had to demonstrate achievement in spite of significant disadvantages in their lives. They also were required to have a scholastic record indicating capability to succeed in college. Jerald Bradshaw honored three students who were selected from their elementary schools for their outstanding pioneer essays. The students were Ethan Albert Ostraff, from the Edgemont Elementary school, Kelli Pamela McCullough from the Canyon Crest Elementary school and Sally Monson from the Wasatch Elementary School. In May the chapter had a catered dinner and the guest speaker was Gavle Halverson, the "Berlin Candy Bomber".

CENTERVILLE (Centerville, Utah) The chapter has completed a very successful Pioneer Essay contest with fourth graders from the Centerville and Farmington elementary schools. There were 273 students that participated from the seven schools. The students selected an ancestor or a pioneer historical event to write about. All participants received a letter of achievement and thanks. Each class winner received \$10 prize money and the school winner received an additional \$20. The winning essays from each of the seven schools were judged and a grand prize winner was selected. The essays were well done so the judging was very difficult. Sydney Smith was the grand prize winner and she, her parents and her teacher were invited to the chapter dinner meeting where Sydney was recognized and given \$250. The chapter held a very successful trek on May 9th when they went up Weber canyon and followed the route of the pioneers into the Salt Lake Valley. It was most interesting because four days earlier at the monthly meeting John Eldredge spoke giving information concerning the Utah War.

HOLLADAY (Holladay, Utah) The Holladay Chapter held their annual scholarship presentation meeting on May 8th. David Donohoo, the scholarship chairman, presented scholarships to two very deserving candidates:

The winners were invited, along with their parents, teachers and principle to attend the event. The food was great and the essays were excellent. JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE (South West Salt Lake Valley) The chapter has now completed the fourth grade 2008 - 2009 **Pioneer Essay Program**. Contacts were made to the schools before Thanksgiving with follow-up in the early spring. After the essays were received and judged the chapter President and the Community Relations Director went to the schools and made the presentation of certificates and monetary awards in the presence of teachers and the entire 4th grade students from all the chasses. Russell attended an informational meeting about Camp Floyd and was elected as the first president of the "**Friends of Camp Floyd**". He has written several short biographies and combined them into a book He shared some of the stories with the group.


LITTLE SALT LAKE (Parowan, Utah) At the



April chapter meeting Dr. **Wayne Hinton** (left) from the Southern Utah University talked about the history of the railroad in Utah, particularly about its entry into southern Utah. As construction of the rails progressed south from Salt Lake City thriving communities were

developed. When the Union Pacific line reached Iron County a spur line was built into Cedar City to serve the sheep industry, the iron mines, etc. Eventually the main line reached Los Angeles and became a busy passenger and freight line. With the line into Cedar City a subsidiary company called Utah Parks Co. was organized and lodges were built at the National Parks. Tourists came to Cedar City by train and were then bussed to the various parks. Following W.W. II improved highways and automobiles replaced the rail travel and passenger trains were phased out. Archaeologist Garth Norman was a surprise speaker at the meeting and informed the audience about the Indian New Year and its connection to the Parowan Gap area.

MAPLE MOUNTAIN (Mapleton, Utah) In late April chapter members, their wives and friends met at the **Sun God Picnic Area** (next page) in



Diamond Fork Canyon. There they enjoyed an outstanding Dutch oven dinner prepared by Duane Nielsen, who holds honors from Dutch oven competition. The dinner was followed by chapter member, Dean Tew, giving a brief ancestral biography. The guest speaker for the evening was Dale Bascom, who has studied and written about archaeological sites in Utah. His presentation was titled "A Message in Time". He spoke of the presence of the Spanish in the area and of the Native Americans, showing photos of the different types of signs and landmarks they left. During the evening, tours were taken up the small red cliff canyon where a ladder and safety rope had been provided to assist in hiking up to the pictograph sun rock carving. This carving is of ancient origin. Adding to the pleasure of the outing was the beauty of the red rock mountain cliffs, the lush canyon hills, trees and other vegetation. It was truly a great evening.

MILLS (Southeast Salt Lake City) Maurice Pia and his wife, Carol, hosted the May meeting where the 2009 chapter scholarships were awarded. The Granger High School principal gave background on the students and each student gave a short talk telling of their academic achievements and the progress they have made in their personal lives. The students were Adriana Garcia, Harjit Kave and Minh Tran Quang. Adriana came from Mexico 12 years ago and has lived in Utah two years. Her ambition is to get a law degree and to help women in need. Harjit was born in **India** and came to the U.S. three years ago. Her goal is to become a M.D. in cardiology and to help other people. Minh came from **Viet Nam** five years ago. His goal is to become an engineer or a medical doctor and help children in Africa. Following the scholarship awards program Chapter President, **Michael Bennett**, spoke on the **History of Theater in the LDS Church**. He has worked in over 100 films and eight episodes of "**Touched by an Angel**".

SETTLEMENT CANYON (Tooele, Utah) On May 7th the chapter held their monthly dinner meeting at the Senior Citizens Center and then moved to the corner of Vine Street and 100 West where a program was held to dedicate the new **Mud Wall Monument** (below).



This new monument depicts the Mud Wall that was built around Tooele by the early pioneers. The monument was installed by chapter members with a great deal of effort. Many individuals and businesses contributed materials and labor. In spite of weather delays and other frustrations along the way, the monument is now completed and dedicated and looks good and adds much to the community. The chapter recently went on a trek to the **Tooele Military Collection** located on the west side of the city. The chapter's pioneer museum is open Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays. It is a great treasure for the chapter and is an attraction for the city.

TAYLORSVILLE - BENNION (Taylorsville, Utah) The program for the May chapter meeting was arranged for by **President Jim Taney**. It was entertainment provided by **Kent Peterson and his band**.
