# Area Councils Need to be Held - July or August



On July 22, the chapter will unveil their new Pioneer Mail Trail monument in Mantua.

On June 13, twenty-two members of the **Brigham Young Chapter** toured the LDS Welfare Square Sorting Center, the Governor's Mansion, This is the Place Heritage Park and the SUP National Headquarters, where Florence Youngberg treated them to an explanation of the many historical treasures in the national library (shown below).



A major restoration project is underway by the **Sevier Valley Chapter**, as one of seven lime kilns in the adjacent hills north of Richfield is

being preserved. A trail with benches located along-side leads from the new road and parking area to the site, where a large monument will also be erected.

The kiln, constructed in 1903, was used for several years. Lime rocks mined nearby were heated to a high



temperature for five days, then cooled for three days to prepare the lime for use in construction. Completion of the project by Fall is planned.

The **Settlement Canyon Chapter** reminds us of an idea for a good mini-trek for any chapter or group. At the Temple Granite Quarry in Little Cottonwood Canyon, three fine historians present weekly illustrated lectures describing the arrival of the Mormon Pioneers and the huge quarrying project to build the Salt Lake Temple. the north on Wasatch Drive, watch for Temple Quarry Nature Trail signs just before the mouth of Little Cottonwood Canyon. Turn right, then left to the amphitheatre. From the south on Wasatch Drive, turn right at the Temple Quarry sign.
