



## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I feel deeply honored and fortunate to have been elected to serve you as your President for the 2016 year. A year ago I began my term as President-elect which included attending weekly Executive Council meetings at our SUP Headquarters in Salt Lake City. My professional career had me involved with

executive councils at three major universities, as well as in church callings, but none of those matched the quality of my experience this year with the SUP. Tom Alexander, a professor of history at BYU and historian of national esteem, has been the perfect choice as our 2015 President with his rich knowledge of pioneer history and experience at the executive level. Bob Folkman, retiring as Past President, has a detailed grasp of SUP events, decisions, and leadership. Retiring National Treasurer

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Jay Smith's competence and devotion to SUP are legendary. Our new President-elect, John Elggren, speaks with knowledge and authority based on his extensive experience at the Chapter and National levels. John Smith is the newly appointed Treasurer who already knows the job, as he previously served as SUP Treasurer. The dynamic duo of Heather Davis, Office Manager, and Linda Sorenson, Building Manager, rounds out our leadership team for what promises to be a new year of continued progress. Our Executive Council deliberations and decisions will continue to be based on mutual respect, affection and total commitment. The coming year looks bright indeed!

In early June of 1953 I graduated from high school at a time our nation was at war in Korea. Both of my brothers had served in the armed forces during WWII, one in the South Pacific and the other in the storied 82nd Airborne Division. I had always assumed that in time of war I too would step forward to serve my country. Accordingly, I volunteered to have my name placed first on the induction list at our local draft board. Shortly thereafter I received my notice. I had only seen my mother weep two times in my life, once when my older brother had departed for his military service and the second time when my other brother had departed. She was

now softly weeping for the third time as I gave her a departing hug. My father embraced me and whispered in my ear, "Son, give 'em the best you've got!". I was deeply touched because his words reflected the deep love I felt from him and the devotion he had for our Country. I resolved in that moment to do exactly as my father had advised, to give my unqualified best effort in service to our Country, and beyond. Several days later I stood along with other inductees, raised my right arm to the square, and took an oath to protect our country "against all enemies, foreign and domestic". I have a vivid memory of that moment because raising my arm to the square and taking an oath reflects all that I am and aspire to become.

My father's advice served me well in the mission field as a young man when I was called to serve as 2nd Counselor in the Mission Presidency. It served me well in my education at Weber College, The University of Utah and again at BYU and Duke University for my Ph.D. in Psychology. It served me well in my professional career in higher education both in the classroom and administration. I retired as a Vice President and Emeritus Professor of Psychology. It served me well in a variety of Church callings including twice as Bishop, a Stake Presidency and two senior missions. Most important, it served me well in my eternal marriage to Joan Rees and with our four beloved children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, all of whom I love more than life itself.

Tuesday, December 8th I stood together with other newly appointed officers at the Sons of Utah Pioneers National Headquarters and again raised my right arm to the square and listened carefully to the Oath of Office:

"I do solemnly swear that I will fulfill to the best of my ability the responsibilities and spirit of the office to which I have been elected or appointed. I will support and sustain the heritage and traditions of the Pioneers in a manner that will enhance their honor and legacy. I pledge my support to the National Society of the Sons of Utah Pioneers in this position."

As I responded with my sincere "I Do" my mind went back to the day my father embraced me and charged me to "Son, give 'em the best you've got". I was again touched with the solemnity of the Oath and of my silent promise to my father that day. I will indeed during this coming year in my service as President, Give the best I've got! That is my pledge to one and all in our National Society of the Sons of Utah Pioneers!



# BRIGHAM YOUNG CHAPTER (Provo – Orem)

At the November dinner meeting Barbara Morgan, an associate professor of Church History at Brigham Young University, discussed the impact of the Mormon Colonies in northern Mexico on the growth and the strength of the LDS Church since the colonists arrived in Mexico in the 1880s. The title of her paper was "The impact of the Mormon Colonies in Mexico on the spread of the Church". Barbara comes to the topic well prepared. Although her graduate degrees specialized in educational technology and international education development, she applied these disciplines to education in Mexico, with particular focus on Mormon achievements and accomplishments in furthering literacy and educational opportunities for young church members.

The remarkable ripple effect from the origins of the Juarez Academy in 1895 is not only significant on the educational front

but on the meteoric rise in LDS church membership in Mexico in the 20th century. Although some have made this argument before, she provides additional perspective on the hows and whys. She made a compelling argument that these early pioneers provided the necessary impetus to provide a solid foundation, which the church used in teaching and baptizing thousands, then tens of thousands, and eventually hundreds of thousands of Mexican converts. From mere hundreds of members in the 1890s, the Church today numbers well over a million members.

Her research, in addition to the use of records in libraries and archives, consisted of a number of oral histories conducted in both the United States and Mexico. She discussed the evolution of Church policies and philosophy on the educational goals the Church wanted to implement for the benefit of the Saints in Mexico and why changes were made. Although difficult decisions were required and adjustments necessary, the current situation in which the Church finds itself indicates that these changes have rebounded to the benefit of all. -- Harvard Heath, Chapter Historian

# Summary of November Pioneer Vignette presented by Dick Hodson

Dick Hodson of Orem gave

the vignette of his pioneer past by juxtaposing two rather opposite family lines. He spoke with pride and a sense of honor from having descended from

President Hugh B. Brown, (which line

has Brigham Young as its most well-known forebear). He gave a brief

account of President Brown's achievements and the sanguine affects his life had on his

family in particular and on

the Church in general. His opposite line was more infamous than famous, with some notoriety but more notorious for the affect this line has had on the LDS Church. This was the **Jeffs family**,

whose outrageous conduct and apostate beliefs have

not only caused

the Church national embarrassment but for followers of some of the members of the Jeffs family, untold suffering and abuse

for years.

They are the parents of five children. He was born in Salt Lake City Nov 14, 1926. He attended BYU, U of U, and Teachers College at Columbia University where he received an Ed.D.

Kenneth served as an assistant provost and an assistant professor at Columbia University in New York City. He later served as the executive dean at Fresno State College. In 1970 Commissioner Neal A. Maxwell asked him to serve as an associate commissioner of education over Church schools, including the Church College of Hawaii, Ricks College, LDS Business College, and all elementary and secondary schools. He served ten years in that position, and then he served in the International Materials Management Division of the Church.

In 1986 he was asked to serve as the president of LDS Business College. He served there until his retirement in 1991. From 1991 to 1993 Kenneth and his wife served as the first missionary couple in Mongolia. As a young man he served a mission in Northern States. Kenneth and Donna are valuable members of our Centerville SUP Chapter.

Sharon Moore, Joan Bentley, and Christine Sander, wife of the late Richard A. Sander.


Thank you, again, Jan and Shauna Treseder for the wonderful delicious dinner. We really appreciate all you both do along with some help from David and Stephen Treseder.

# MAPLE MOUNTAIN CHAPTER (Spanish Fork, Utah)



Elder Kent D. Watson

The Maple Mountain Chapter's last meeting was held on December 10.

speaker for the evening was Elder Kent D. Watson. **Emeritus** member of the Ouorum of the Seventy. He is a native of Cedar City where he now resides. Professionally he

was a certified public accountant and worked as a partner for the international accounting firm of Price Waterhouse. Besides working in Utah and then California, he became CEO and Chairman of the Board of Price Waterhouse Coopers in China.

After serving as the mission president in Taiwan, he was called to the Second Quorum of the Seventy in 2008 and served in the Asia Area Presidency until 2013. Our outgoing president, Jay Smith and his wife, JenaVee, worked with him as they served as welfare specialists in Hong Kong from 2009-2010. He is currently in a Church leadership position as head of the Church Audit Committee. Elder Watson's topic dealt with the pioneering efforts of the Church in Asia and the prospect for further growth in the years to come.

The Asia Area includes 25 countries containing 3.5 billion people. Only eighteen of those countries have Church units. There are 2 temples, 10 missions, 29 stakes and 42 districts.

His first remarks centered on how the Church functions in China where the government has no restrictions on expatriates forming branches and districts. There are even virtual expatriates branches where members, living in remote areas in small numbers, meet in on-line meetings. Speakers in Sacrament Meeting or teachers in classes could be in any one of 60 cities. It has proven to be very successful.

There are severe restrictions in China on proselyting or baptizing local people, though there are no restrictions on an individual joining the Church out of the country and then coming back to China where they meet in small home groups.

The Church is well established in several of the countries, such as Hong Kong where it has been organized for 50 years and is multigenerational. Two general authorities have been called from Hong Kong and are a part of that multigenerational Church. Hong Kong has a temple and four stakes. There has been phenomenal growth in Taiwan where Elder Watkins served his first mission. He called it the "engine of the Church" in the Asia Area. There are now fourteen stakes there. Over half the full time missionaries in Taiwan are local.

Other countries that are developing a strong member base are Singapore and Cambodia. India now has two missions and two stakes, yet the number of members is miniscule when compared to the 200 million Muslims and over a billion Hindus in the country. Both Pakistan and Bangladesh have over 150 million Muslims each. There is one branch in Bangladesh with 25 members. Pakistan has three districts and only local missionaries serving in the country due to governmental restrictions.

Because of the strong Hindu, Muslim, or political influence a number of the countries limit proselyting. However, some countries have innovative efforts to encourage growth such as Sri Lanka and Vietnam. Local members called "branch builders" are used much like missionaries.

He concluded with the fact that in all the countries in the Asia Area the Lord is doing His work in His way and His time as the Gospel is being carried to all the world. The Chapter members came away with a realization of how daunting that effort is in the Asian Area, yet, knowing it will go forward with acceptance and growth. Go To

This event took place in Salina, Utah in 1945 where 350 German prisoners of war were interred. A U S Army soldier took over a machine gun in a guard tower and strafed the camp. Nine soldiers died and many others were injured. They were cared for in local hospitals, the camp was closed and the prisoners were transferred to other locations. The event was covered up. Before the incident, the prisoners were well treated by the townspeople and even produced some at which was given to them. The pictures show a small jewel box and a portrait painted of the man in the picture.

Richard's presentation was on the history of the local Sons of Utah Pioneers Chapter. He said that in the past, scrapbooks were kept of events that people wanted to remember. Now there are new methods of keeping records. He has started a digital record of the history of the Temple Fork Chapter of the Sons of the Utah Pioneers.

It can include photographs, but
also short videos of the events that
happen. The videos would not
cover the entire programs, but would show
significant clips of the programs. The digital record
can be easily duplicated, so that any member of the
group who wants a copy could have one, which is

not possible with scrapbooks.

His digital record contains the following categories: Past Presidents, Board Officers, Board Minutes,

> Dinner Programs, Scholarship, Modern Pioneer Awards, Monuments, Treks, and Obituaries.

The group enjoyed viewing excerpts from some of these categories. The Past Presidents section was viewed. Some of the board members were shown, and a video was shown of the officers currently serving being sworn in last January.

Pictures of a few programs, some scholarship winners, one Modern Pioneer and two obituaries were shown.

A video was shown of members of the group on a trek that took the Front Runner from Ogden for a tour of the

TOUR 1




