# YEARLY SYMPOSIUM A GRAND SUCCESS

A most outstanding yearly SUP Symposium was greatly enjoyed Saturday, Sept. 18, by folks coming from as far away as 600 and 800 miles to attend, and exclaiming that it was even better than expected. The thyme of the symposium was, "The Doctrine of Pioneering--Adam into the Millennium--Gospel Pioneering--Always to the Covenant (Temple)". The theme was presented in fulfillment of the commandment, "Know ye that ye must come to a knowledge of your fathers?" (Mormon. 7:5) Presenters at the symposium illustrated how pioneering was unto the temple.

Dr. Wilfred Griggs (right), a noted BYU Egyptian archaeologist, illustrated with slides how even the Egyptian pyramids were used as a type of temple. He also illustrated how pyramids were not



used as burial tombs, but instead served as empty tombs depicting the resurrection as a prototype of the Savior's empty tomb. His topic was "Pioneering to the Covenant--Joseph Smith, Pyramids, & Temples." He emphasized how Joseph Smith's explanations of the Abrahamic Egyptian facsimile were reliable, authentic, authoritative and beyond the scholarship of his day, and even our day, in contrast to the would-be critics who rely on the ever changing theories of man.

Dr. Ray Huntington (right), BYU professor of Ancient Scripture, depicted The Exodus as a "Pioneering Prototype of Things to Come (Duet. 4:20)- Coming unto the Covenant, the Temple." He demonstrated how from



Adam down through history the exodus or pioneering served as a sacred journey by which God's children sought to commit themselves to Him.

Vatican." He gave "a
glimpse of a modern



day strategy for friendshiping that eventually led us on a trailblazing trek to Rome." He concluded with, "We have opportunities in each of our lives, whether the scope of our reach is local, cosmopolitan, or throughout this good earth, to participate in some small way or in a significant way, to witness or contribute to the unfolding of the Lord's work.



Dr. Michael Ballam (left), unable to present due to unexpected preparations in New York for an international music competition in Rome later, provided a DVD for Dr. Larry La Mar Adams to

adapt to the topic of, "Music: Pioneering through the Ages; Songs of the Redeemed"

(Mosiah. 15:29-31). Concepts presented included: 1) music is the language of the Gods provided through the light of Christ to those who seek, 2) the adversary also uses the power of music through his forces to rule his world, 3) music was used in pioneering from the beginning of time, 4) music serves both in the covenant ordinances to help bring us to the Savior, and as an ordinance in itself through the Song of the Redeemed and shouting praises to the Holy one of Israel. It is used in the very most important occasions, as when the choirs, angles of Heaven, sang at the birth of the Savior, and at His triumphal entry into Jerusalem.



Elder Melvin J.
Ballard (left) gave a wonderful keynote address on "Pioneering from Adam to the Restoration," at the lovely evening banquet. He said, "Of course, the greatest pioneer of all is the Savior...No footsteps in time or eternity

have required such perfect faith as did the footsteps of the Savior. His great Atonement is beyond expression the most remarkable footstep of faith. You all know he was the greatest



pioneer that has ever lived." Elder Ballard added, "But even though the wilderness we've been given to conquer is decidedly different from the rough and rocky trail to Utah and the barren landscape that our pioneer forebears encountered in 1847, it is no less challenging and trying for us than it was for them," He stated. "And it is certainly no less important for us to keep our eyes on the prophet, our shoulders to the wheel, and our feet firmly planted on the trail of faithfulness." Elder Ballard said that our pioneer task is to build on the faith of our fathers through constant scripture study, pray, obey and repent. He declared, "Ahead of us will be the faith to defend religious liberty here in America. We must build relationships with those who love God and believe that religion has every right to speak out in the public square in behalf of people of faith who choose to worship God according to the dictates of their own conscience. This will require faith in the footsteps of the Latter-day Saints."

## **CHAPTER NEWS**

CEDAR CITY (Cedar City, Utah) Leon **Matheson**, as project director, and several members of the chapter spent considerable time and effort to obtain property and build a monument which is located on Hornet Hill and which honors Captain Maurice Francis Graham, a pilot, patriot and pioneer. The chapter took a trek to the site and participated in the unveiling of the monument on Saturday, September 18, 2010. The thirty two individuals who participated caravanned twenty five miles across the Kolob Scenic Highway to Hornet Hill. The first portion of the unveiling was by Van Bushnell, chapter president. The second portion was unveiled by Tina Hahn, the Cedar City Post Master. The remaining of the unveiling was by Evadeen Cox Milne, the last living person known who had visited the site at the time of the incident. Prior to the start of the trek a narrative of the history behind the monument was given by Leon. A question and answer period was spent following the unveiling. **CENTERVILLE** (Centerville, Utah) A very successful dinner meeting was held in September with over 120 in attendance. **Rebecca Burnham** (shown below with her father on her left and Paul Boss, the chapter Scholarship Chairman, on her right) spoke and thanked all those who



contributed to the scholarship fund. She was the Viewmont High School scholarship winner. She shared some tender moments about her mother's passing and the strength of her father and family as they carry on. Her father, Dave Burnham, accompanied her at the meeting. She is now enrolled at Weber State University. The


**Utah Old Time Fiddlers** (above) provided fun entertainment for the remainder of the program.

COTTON MISSION (St. George, Utah) As is tradition, the chapter held the August meeting at the Terry's Twin Springs Ranch. As the crowd gathered they were entertained by cowboy songs performed by Thad Stewart. Following the Dutch oven dinner they heard from Gail and Hyrum Smith. The Smiths had just spent five weeks as volunteers at Nauvoo helping with the

General for seven western states. He talked about the history of modern Israel and the relationship between Israel and the United States. He reported some statistics that show how his small country leads the world in new patents and new businesses started. The evening concluded with John Garner singing some popular songs from the 50's and 60's. His accompanist was Pal Eckman

**HOLLADAY** (Holladay, Utah) The guest speaker for the September chapter dinner meeting was Dean Jessee, who in his career was a respected archivist, editor and historian. He was also an authority on early Mormon handwriting. He was assigned by Leonard Arrington to locate, collect and transcribe all of Joseph Smith, Jr.'s writings. In 1984 he published most of Joseph Smith's own writings and many of his dictations, in The Personal Writing of Joseph Smith. Brother Jessee's efforts eventually led to the joint effort by BYU and the LDS church called the Joseph Smith **Papers Project** where he serves as a general editor for the project. Brother Jessee stressed the importance of accurate and detailed history and referenced the written histories of our founding fathers. He answered questions about the Joseph Smith Papers.

**HURRICANE VALLEY** (Hurricane, Utah) In August the chapter honored **Roland Hall** as a



"Modern-Day Pioneer" (above). Roland grew up in Hurricane. As a child he experienced many of the deprivations the pioneers went through. He graduated from the local high school and served in the military. He worked as a heavy equipment operator using front end loaders, power shovels, etc. With that skill he worked tirelessly as "foreman" on the "Look-out Point Monument". He has been a loyal, dedicated, hard working and dependable husband, father and friend. He was honored for all he has done to bless the lives he has touched. At the dinner

meeting where the award was presented two of his grandchildren performed a piano and violin solo.

JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE (Southwest Salt Lake Valley) The chapter was pleased to have Clive Romney (below) speak and perform at



their September meeting. His subject was "Don't let them be Forgotten". He informed the group about the Utah Pioneer Heritage Arts
Foundation and its purpose to preserve Utah Pioneer arts. His program for the chapter included a couple of songs which he had written, one about his grandparents. Prior to writing that song he did considerable research to know who they were and how they lived. He suggests that we all need to research and get to know our fore bearers better. He recited a story about the last wagon down the Hole in the Rock. Mr. Romney also demonstrated some games that Pioneer children played.

LITTLE SALT LAKE (Parowan, Utah)
The Five Mile Picnic area (below) was the site



for the August meeting of the chapter. Funds for the main course of the meal came from the chapter and then other items came by assignment. Following the delightful meal the group was entertained with patriotic songs performed by **Jay Wilken**. The weather was perfect and the view of Vermillion Castle (below) was enjoyed as the sun set.



MILLS (Southeast Salt Lake City) The chapter met at the Canyon Rim Park where they enjoyed dinner and heard four of their members give short sketches of their pioneer ancestors.

Darrell Knight reported on Jesse Knight who

was inspired to develop the "Humbug Mine" which brought him great wealth. He used his wealth as a stewardship to keep men working during a recession and he saved the credit of the church and some of the leaders through his donations. He was one of the "fathers" of the Brigham Young University.

**Steve Haslam** told of his ancestor **John S. Haslam** who was born in England in 1821. He

worked as a deck hand on a ship that sailed to America. He became acquainted with **Orson** 

**Hyde** and was urged to go to Nauvoo and join the church. He became a blacksmith and operated one of the cannons used to defend Nauvoo against the mobs in 1846.

Frank Madsen reported on John Lothrup who was a pastor in the Church of England and who rebelled against the church due to restrictive practices. He arrived in Massachusetts in 1634. From his descendants came many of the prominent Smith family who were leaders in the Church. Frank

told of another ancestor, **Rev. Frances Marbury**, who also rebelled against the Church of England, came to America and had a daughter, Anne Marbury (Hutchinson) who was considered the most "Intelligent woman in America." She and 12 of her 13 children were "tomahawked" by Indians. The remaining child survived and became Frank's ancestor.

David Wirthlin told of his ancestor, Leopold Wirthlin, who was born in Switzerland, joined the church and came to America. He traveled by wagon to Utah and settled in the Payson area. He was called back to his homeland as a missionary. His wife supported him by sewing gunny sacks at 10 cents per 100. When he returned home from his mission he contracted TB which was the cause of his death. His son was Joseph Wirthlin, a close friend of Jesse Knight. He invested in mining with Jesse and retired at age 45 because of the earnings from his mining ventures.-

**MOUNT NEBO** (Payson, Utah) In July **John Francis** (below) spoke to the chapter about



edible plants. The setting was natural since they were enjoying a pot luck dinner at the Blackhawk campground. The August meeting was held at Ted Murdock's home in Santaquin. Ted's



wife, Cynthia, (left) gave an informative report on the Mormon Colonies in Mexico. She lived in the Colonies for some years and has visited the area several times since leaving there.

## **SETTLEMENT CANYON** (Tooele, Utah) Dee Jay Bawden (below) presented the program for the chapter in September. He told some of the history of his life and about some of the sculptures he has produced. He was born in Salt Lake City and grew up during the fifties and sixties. He described his early years and said that he always had a desire to become

an artist. He was



encouraged by his high school teachers to develop his talent in sculpting. He was introduced to noted artist **Ed Fraughton** and studied under him while attending the University of Utah. He sold several pieces of his art while in high school. His desire was always to work full time with his art but it was necessary to work at other employment at first to support himself and his family. Prior to his 30<sup>th</sup> birthday he was inspired to quit his job and follow his interest. From then on he was able to obtain enough work to meet his needs with his art work. Throughout his message his testimony of the gospel was evident. Dee has produced several sculptures for

the church (left and right). He told how he came to sculpt the bust of the **Prophet** Joseph Smith. He was able to get a copy of the death masks of Joseph and Hyrum and from them he was able to sculpt a bust that is considered to be the most accurate in depicting the Prophet (below).





He is the artist who sculpted "Eyes Westward" which is placed in Nauvoo and at the "This is the Place Heritage Park".

TAYLORSVILLE – BENNION (Taylorsville, Utah) The most recent trek taken by the chapter was on September 11<sup>th</sup> and included a tour of the **Hutchinson Museum** located in Lehi. The group spent an enjoyable two hour visit at the museum and then finished the trek with a delicious meal at Porter's Restaurant. They had met in Taylorsville and used carpooling as their means of transportation.

## **Hornet Hill Monument**

## **Captain Maurice Francis Graham**

Pilot, Patriot, Pioneer



The disappearance of a Western Air Services Boeing 95 mail plane during an intense snow storm thrust Cedar City, Utah, into the sharp focus of world attention. It was not because such accidents were uncommon, for air crashes were quite common in early aviation. But the pilot of this airplane was a very uncommon person—internationally renowned for his courage and flying ability.

Captain Maurice (Maury) Francis Graham was a hero of WWI, credited with saving the lives hundreds of American servicemen of the Lost Battalion when their unit was overrun by German ground forces in a dense



fog. He was a recipient of both the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) and the French Legion of Honor (LOH), and Maury was considered by many to be the world's foremost weather-capable pilot. He pioneered a viable airmail route from Los Angeles to Salt Lake City for Western Air Services, of which he was also a co-founder; he was at home in the air and on the mail route.

Maury Graham departed from Los Angeles on January 10, 1930 with a scheduled refueling stop at Las Vegas, NV. Finding he was pacing a fast-moving snow storm Maury elected to continue ahead of the storm to deliver the mail on time. Smoke pots and flares were lighted and waiting at Cedar City but his intended landing was thwarted by heavy snow. Maury was last reported over the Cedar City airport flying to the northwest. He was never heard from again.

The search for Maury eventually involved resources of the US Postal Service, air lines, Iron County residents and the entire Army Air Corps, the largest and longest aerial search in history, all to no avail. It was not until late spring that the mail plane was eventually discovered by Parowan residents Elburn Orton and Ward Mortensen, 2 miles east of Hornet Hill on Kanarra Mountain.

In an extraordinary feat of airmanship Maury Graham had managed to land safely in the dark of night, in a howling snow storm, on top of a 9,500 ft mountain, in the dead of winter, and with no beacon or visual reference to guide him! Maury had only a turn & bank indicator, airspeed indicator, altimeter and a compass in the airplane; no radio, no attitude gyro and no means of communication.

The mail bin was found to be sealed and there was fuel in the wing tanks, the engine and airframe were both intact and returned to service. Messages left for rescuers indicated Maury was proceeding eastward. Some 500 Iron County residents searched for weeks for the missing mail pilot, with ample rewards to encourage them in their quest. His remains were eventually discovered in late July by his friends and wingmen in Spanish Hollow, Crystal Creek Canyon. The securities mail bag was in his arms. Maury Graham's last log entry was, "January 11, 1930. Arrived 2:35 AM. No destination".

Maury Graham: "PILOT", "PATRIOT", "PIONEER", had given his life to see the mail go through.

## "Faith in Every Footstep" Grave Markers

In 1997, a Church committee created a marker to be attached to the graves of Pioneers who arrived in the valley prior to the coming of the railroad. These were sold to anyone who wanted to attach one to the grave of his or her ancestor, in commemoration of the sesquicentennial of the arrival of the Pioneers in 1847.

For some time the markers have not been available, and we (the SUP) have had frequent requests as to how to get them. The National office of the SUP has made arrangements to have a number of them manufactured and are making them available to members or others who wish honor their ancestors by attaching one to his or her grave marker.


The markers are 2 ½ inches by 3 ½ inches of very durable metal. Those who attached them in 1997 say they have not deteriorated from weather.


