

ORSON D. WRIGHT, OBITUARY



Dr. Orson D. Wright, beloved husband, father, grandfather and friend passed away on July 5 th , 2017 in Salt Lake City, Utah.

He was born March 13, 1928 in Salt Lake City, Utah to Orson Pettit Wright and Pearl Davis Wright. He attended Uintah Elementary, Roosevelt Jr High School, and East High School in SLC. He

was active in sports, school activities, and in the orchestra. He went on to study at the University of Utah receiving B.S. Degrees in Zoology and Chemistry.

There he was a member and officer of the Sigma Chi Fraternity and later of the Delta Phi returned missionary fraternity. Having nearly finished his college education, he accepted a missionary call from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints to serve in Australia after which he returned to graduate from the University of Utah in 1951.

Orson met his eternal sweetheart, Patricia Anne Pearson, at the U of U and they were sealed in the Salt Lake Temple on March 16, 1951 and enjoyed a wonderful union for 63 years before she passed away in Dec, 2014. They left shortly after their marriage to attend Washington University School of Dentistry in Missouri, Graduating in 1955 with highest honors. Following graduation he served two years as a captain in the U. S. Air force at Francis E. Warren Air Force Base at Cheyenne Wyoming, where he increased his skills in many areas of dentistry.

Returning home to Salt Lake City, he opened his dental practice that extended nearly fifty years.

From 1960 to 1978 he served as the Utah State Dental Director. Orson was able to revitalize the Dental and Medical community positions in Emery County and he

brought dental care into Monument Valley by arranging with Loma Linda University Dental School to send students there to practice as part of their education. He was a member of the Monument Valley Hospital Board.

He served on two governors committees on health and assisted in evaluations of many dental schools and institutions. He organized and taught many classes with teachers in Utah and compiled a Teacher's Guide for Teachers of Utah and wrote a manual for dental care in nursing homes and for the handicapped.

One of the most rewarding was his service over 52 years as a member of the National Society of the Sons of the Utah Pioneers wherein he served as the National President in 1972-1973 and as President of the Past National Presidents for eleven years. As the Director of the SUP Pioneer Village in Salt Lake he managed the sale of the Village and its transfer to Lagoon in 1976. With the proceeds he was able to promote the building of the SUP headquarters office and Building at the mouth of Parleys canyon. He directed the placement of the Pioneer Memorial Monument ("All is Well") at the Brigham Young grave site for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

He was very active in Scouting. He served as high council member over scouting, district scouting leader, and vice president of GSL scout council. He attended Philmont ranch, received the Silver Beaver award, and served as president of the Silver Beavers.

Being very active in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, he has served in many capacities as teacher, quorum leader, branch president, member of district presidency, bishopric member, bishop, high councilor, missionary, stake missions, mission president, SL temple ordinance worker, and temple square tour guide for 20 years.

Orson loved his wife, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. His most beautiful times were those spent with his family and loved ones.

He shares his testimony of the truth of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and its restoration.

SUPER DUPER DAY

AT THIS IS THE PLACE STATE PARK

On Monday, July 17, we held our annual pioneer days celebration at the This Is The Place park. Held in conjunction with the Daughters of Utah Pioneers, it was truly a SUPer DUPer day.

The day started out with a bit of stormy weather, but cleared up to a beautifully mild evening. We enjoyed all of the venues of the park, then gathered in the bowery, much as our pioneer ancestors did. There we were entertained by the Days of 47 Royalty singing and then listened to Elder Jeffrey R Holland speak.

The use of the Bowery proved a wonderful idea, being centrally located and spacious. The Bowery was full and many sat on the grass to hear the events.

Elder Holland told of his ancestry. "First, a comment about my Holland family, who clearly were not Utah pioneers," he said. "They were a rowdy, but loveable, bunch of Roman Catholic miners born in Ireland who made their way to Montana and Colorado, ending up in Park City at the turn of the 20th century."

Widowed at the age of 26 with two little boys, Elder Holland's father being the youngest, his grandmother eventually made her way to Salt Lake City, where she was blessed by the friendship of John Fetzer, the kindly bishop of the old Salt Lake City 8th Ward.

"The rest, as they say, is history," Elder Holland said. "My grandmother and my father, he by then a 14-year-old boy, joined the Church in 1924."

Stricken by smallpox, he was taken out of school by his stepfather, "a loss of opportunity and a blow to his self-esteem that he never fully overcame," Elder Holland related.

"But heaven had its hand on him when, as a Civilian Conservation Corps recruit, he found himself in southern Utah in the early 1930s during the Depression, where he met and married my mother.

"What a union! A gleeful, Irish dance hall piano-playing convert from Roman Catholicism who went through life with a smile on his face and a shine on his shoes marrying a very proper, stay-at-home, quilting and canning, canning and cooking, genuine and thoroughly domestic daughter of Utah pioneers. What a marriage!

"I am the product of that union!"

HEARTS OF THE CHILDREN

The grieving father places the lifeless, frozen form of his ten year-old son in his mother's lap as she sits on the ground, in the snow. He picks up his broken shovel and a borrowed pick and steps off the trail a few paces to make a grave, the second in so many weeks.

The mother's face is the picture of pain as she softly caresses the boy's frozen face. It is not the face of one peacefully dead. The boy died in the night, frozen to death in the little tent, unable to endure the storms any longer. His jaw is pushed to one side, strangely askew, frozen that way since life left his body somewhere in the night. No peace in this death. His muddy hair is matted on one side with a flatiron of ice frozen in it. He looks more like an animal found dead on the winter plains than the mother's only remaining son, the second to die on this trail of tears.

The icy Wyoming wind whips about the family and a few friends strong enough to help with the burial. There is not much grieving left to share, really. Too many have lost loved ones in similar fashion. Too many crude little graves have been hastily dug along the way. Too many have died. This price seems far too high to pay. Why, begs the unanswered question.

Placing her knitted shawl around the stiff corpse, the mother hands her boy to his father who has chipped away enough of the ice and rocky dirt to form a little dip in the ground — a dip that is already filling with snow as it slices its cutting knife across the frozen land.

As the father and a friend finish casting up ice and rock over the boy, this man, toughened by years of persecution, farming, and now the trek west, crumples to the ground. He is all played out. There is nothing left. He clenches his face against the wind, squeezing out the tears, and sobs great body-shaking sobs.

"Take courage", my voice sighs in the wind, as I speak from the other side of the veil. "Open your eyes and see the

bigger picture, Grandfather!" As a second-great grandson of this pitiful form, sobbing in the snow, I call to him. "Your boy will live again! You will complete your trek to Zion and have more children. Your sons and daughters will grow strong in the Gospel and marry in the temple for eternity. All will be well after all, Grandfather..." My message swirls in the wind, a few words settling into the heart of this pitiful cipher in the snow.

Slowly, Grandfather gathers himself, takes a deep breath of resolve, and steels himself against the remaining trek ahead. Somehow he hears.

I sit in the darkness in my home in Zion. It is 3:00 A.M. and my heart is breaking. My sixteen year-old daughter is out in the night and I have no idea where. I fear the worst.

My wife sits silently in the darkness in the next room. Both of us are quiet. We are grieving for a death...for the spiritual death of a daughter. This is not the first night we have suffered. There have been far too many just like tonight.

Only a year ago, her testimony was alive and healthy. She held a leadership position in her young women class, attended seminary, and was active in our religious family activities. But then she began to stumble. The bright light dimmed by degrees as her testimony began to go out. Do what we may, we could not fan it back into life. She would not have it. And so we fasted and prayed and pleaded and grieved. But the light went out anyway.

She stopped saying her prayers about six months ago. She didn't tell us. We just knew. Then she began skipping church, sluffing seminary, and hanging out with different friends. It was as if her spirit suddenly began to suffer hypothermia. But she refused our warmth. Ran from it. And then the end seemed near.

As our wonderful daughter withdrew from the Church, and then our family, and eventually from anything that

was "virtuous, lovely or of good report," my wife and I had many long, serious talks. What might we do to help? Where had we gone wrong? Could we watch a second child turn a back to the bright truths we had taught so diligently?

I hear my wife begin crying in the dark. At first it is barely noticeable. But then the whimper turns to a sob and bursts forth without restraint. I step to where she sits and place an arm around her to give her comfort. My strength. The strength of a righteous husband and father in Zion. But the strength is not there to be given. I am at such a loss that my reassuring touch changes to a faltering grasp.

Together, we fall to our knees and begin to plead with the Lord once again. Pleading between the tears. Is this really what we must endure? Can we stand to see the spiritual death of our children? Surely, Lord, this price is too high. Surely there is a better way!

"Take courage!" a voice whispers in the darkness, a voice from three generations past. "Take courage and see the bigger picture," it says. "Yes, your daughter may be

stumbling in the darkness. Yes, her testimony may have dwindled in unbelief. But it will revive. The light of the Gospel will burn bright once more. She is not dead to the truth forever! Be still, and know that she will eventually return. Stay true. Stay faithful. Stay the course and you will see," the voice of my second great-grandfather whispers in the darkness of the night.

Our anguished voices soften. Together, we slump to the floor in an embrace as the Spirit stokes back our frayed nerves and soothes our aching hearts. Somehow, we hear.

The path that each of us is called to travel is strewn with tears and heartache of one kind or another. Trek well, my pioneer Latter-day Saint friends. Hear the encouraging cries of your ancestors. Listen to the Holy Spirit. Know that there are those on both sides of the veil that feel your grief. Stay the course. Keep the faith. The crown of victory will come, by and by.

Take courage!

BOX ELDER CHAPTER - Brigham City, Utah

BOX ELDER SUP CHAPTER MEETING 12 JULY 2017:

The Box Elder chapter of the SUP has been a very successful chapter for a very long time. We have had some extremely interesting dinner meeting guest speakers arranged by Jack Small of the board of directors, and Past President. Wednesday the 12th of July

was no exception. Mrs. Kathleen Bradford, a longtime resident of Brigham City, was our guest speaker, talking about the settlement of Brigham City. Of course, it has to include the most successful co-operative program in the history of the LDS church, then called the United Order, organized by Lorenzo Snow in 1856, under the direction of Brigham Young. It included the most important trades and business for a fledgling community to continue to grow, i.e. coopers, carpenters, leather works, woolen mills and fabric

production, lumber mills, blacksmith shops, and a dairy in Collinston.

The first settlers arriving in Brigham City, then known as Box Elder Creek, was one William B. Davis in 1851, and soon others followed. Many of the early settler's names are still prominent in Brigham City to this day. They lived in a crude fort consisting of basically a sleeping room adjoined to each other forming a circle, with a small creek running thru the middle of the fort. They only needed a "room" at night as they were working their farm grounds during the day, trying to establish crops. They soon thereafter moved out of the fort, partly to escape the infestation of bed bugs, to build a better fort. The original fort was named after Davis who later became the first bishop. Many other little known facets were cited by Mrs. Bradford in her presentation.

Box Elder Trek



Bear River Massacre Site

BOX ELDER CHAPTER JUNE TREK: A few of the Box Elder Chapter members enjoyed a trek June 26th as we went to the Bear River Massacre Site. Suzan Hawkes was called and she opened the museum in Franklin, Idaho, so we could enjoy seeing the multitude of artifacts they have there. We also heard about the Co-Operative Mercantile Institution, the Hatch House, and the Doney House. It was very interesting and we thank them for coming in on their day off to enlighten us.

The attack near Preston, Idaho, at the confluence of Bear River and Beaver Creek is considered the largest singe-incident massacre of Indians in the American West – larger than Wounded Knee and Sand Creek. It is often overlooked in history books because it occurred during the Civil War. Most descendants are spread out through Northern UT and Southeastern ID today.

The Indians were growing more troublesome, demanding food from settlers, stealing horses right from the corrals of the pioneers, robbing, and killing miners as they passed through the territory. The settlers were settling the land and disrupting their ability to live their nomadic life style. Treaties were broken by both sides. On Jan. 29, 1863, Colonel Patrick E. Connor and about 200 soldiers attacked the village. When it was over, 493 Indians were dead. 17 soldiers were killed and others died from wounds later.

HOLLADAY CHAPTER - Holladay, Utah

Our July meeting was held at the Pavilion of the South Cottonwood Stake where we enjoyed our traditional summer steak fry. Even though it was held at the "stakehouse" instead of the "steakhouse" and the meal was prepared by "Meiers chicken" not "Meiers beef," it was a wonderful meal and a delightful evening. Of course, it was a pioneer celebration but, that too was not held in the tradition of the "Days of Forty-Seven" manner but, rather to honor those that have been working behind the scene as pioneers in our time. We were honored to have Frank Madsen Jr. as our speaker. Frank has been an active member of the SUP from many years and currently serves as the Stake Patriarch of our neighboring Cottonwood Stake.

Those of you who know this quite, pleasant mannered man would not suspect him of being an undercover agent. However, while serving as Chief of Staff of United States Senator Orrin Hatch he also was serving as a Bishop and other offices of the Church. That dual role caused foreign diplomats to assume he was a man of great influence in the U.S. government and led to a series of miraculous events that led to the Church being introduced in communist countries. Instead of delegations from these countries contacting high officials in the U.S. Government, they felt it would be more productive to use this man of "influence" so they contacted Frank and tried to charm him into getting the Mormon Church to send in missionaries. Of course, they saw no danger in doing so because they felt their subjects had been thoroughly indoctrinated in communism. What they did want was U.S. Currency, which they had observed had been freely spent building the Freiburg Temple.

HOW WAS THE RELIEF SOCIETY MOTTO CHOSEN? "Charity Never Faileth" was] established in 1913 to help the Relief Society maintain its focus on its founding principles and the charge given by Joseph Smith.

WHAT IS MARCH 17, 1842? It's the day Sarah Granger Kimball and Margaret Cook's idea of a sewing committee to help the temple workers turned into a society that was organized after the pattern of the priesthood.

WHAT NEWSPAPER WAS OWNED AND RUN BY WOMEN? "Woman's Exponent" provided a voice for the sisters—it was a place where they could defend and find support for their beliefs through poems, stories, essays and news articles.

WHERE DID MANY RELIEF SOCIETIES MEET? Many ward Relief Societies raised money and built Relief Society Halls as a place to meet for business, cultural activities and worship.

WHAT CAN A PENNY ACCOMPLISH? In Nauvoo, Relief Society members contributed a penny a week for nails, glass and other items to build the temple. Eventually the \$2,000 collected helped save the temple when taxes were due.

WHO WERE THE SINGING MOTHERS? Wards and branches worldwide organized "Singing Mothers," bringing comfort and unity to those struggling to find relief during the Great Depression and WWII. Some groups sang with one another over the radio.

MORGAN PIONEER CHAPTER - Morgan, Utah

The Morgan Chapter of the Sons of Utah Pioneers held its monthly luncheon on June 18, at Larry's Spring Chicken Inn. Marvin Jensen gave the Pioneer the month report. Marvin is linked to the pioneers through his great, great grandfather, Edwin Whiting. Edwin Whiting was born September 9, 1809,

in Lee Massachusetts. He and his family moved to Nelson Ohio where his father **Elisha Whiting** found work. He did receive a limited education and did note that he had a legible handwriting.

Edwin joined the Church in 1838 with his father, Elisha, and all his siblings. His mother had joined before his mother and father were married. Edwin came west in 1849 with the Ezra T. Benson Company. He then served a mission in Ohio and then came west a second time with the Philemon Merrill Company. He later told his granddaughter a story about a buffalo stampede on the prairie where he stood by the wagon train and cracked a whip for a lengthy period of time and turned the herd of stampeding buffalo. He later said he had a lot more help with him than was visible.

Our guest speaker was **Gerald Betournay**, who was born in Boise, Idaho, later moved to Billings, Montana, and finally to Salt Lake City.

Gerald began by describing an experience he and his wife had some 25 years ago at a church social. The Stake President handed each of them a piece of paper and asked them to write their goals for the next 20 years, including a specific date they would be prepared to serve a mission. The President gathered the papers and placed them in a piece of PVC pipe and buried them. Twenty years later, the Stake President dug them up and returned them. As a result, the Betournays have served three missions in recent years.

Their first mission call was to the Johannesburg South Africa Mission. Historically, South Africa had been colonized first by the Dutch who founded Cape Town, largely a farming community where they raised fruits and vegetables to ward off scurvy, which was a large problem on their trade

ships. Later the British obtained control and capitalized on a massive gold mine manned by slave labor, including Blacks and Muslims. Eventually the Dutch regained control and established a highly segregated society encompassing huge farms that even contained their own towns. With Mandela's rise to power, the segregation cycle was broken, resulting in a massive exodus of professional people from the country. The government confiscated land and dispersed it among the general populous, most of whom were ill prepared to manage their own farms; the result - widespread poverty.

The Betournays were first assigned to an area called Nelspruit, meaning Nels Spring, which is located east of Johannesburg near the border. There, two young Missionary Elders had requested permission from the Mission President to form a new Branch. They were granted permission provided they could find a place to meet, and serve as the Branch Presidency. After an extensive search they found a school building that would meet their needs. The school principal agreed that they could use the school provided they present a spiritual message to the student body every Wednesday morning, and pray with each student individually, which they agreed to do.

The missionaries were also given their own key to the school, which was never done in South Africa. As a result they established a strong relationship with families in the community. When the Betournays left they were asked what the people needed most their response was a water supply for the school. The Church responded positively, installing such a system. The Betournays taught school every day. For lunch the students ate the exact same thing each day, Pap (ground corn meal, boiled) mixed with beans, which they prepared over an open fire. The Betournays also served in a community called Bethlehem, located south of Johannesburg. On one occasion more than 81 people attended a convert baptism at the lake there.

Jerry concluded his remarks by challenging all members of the Morgan SUP Chapter to set goals, prepare, and establish a definite plan to service a mission for the Church. He emphasized that the blessings associated with missionary service far overshadow any sacrifice required. Due to changing demographics in Utah, a decline in the number of young missionaries is predicted, creating a growing need for more senior missionaries.

SALT LAKE CITY CHAPTER - Salt Lake City, Utah



Days of '47 Royalty

We were "royally" enchanted and entertained by the Days of '47 Royalty, Queen Maren Cline, First attendant Tess Hanson, and Second attendant Brittny Millington, at our meeting on July 6, 2017. They presented their prepared

program, then responded to a request to play the drums, which they had planned to leave out, but we were pleased that they relented and did an "impromptu" for us.

Elder Jeffrey R. Holland was the featured speaker at the SUPer DUPer Days at the This Is The Place Heritage Park, where members of the Sons of Utah Pioneers, and Daughters of Utah Pioneers were hosted by the park (at reduced entrance fee rates), where the families gathered to picnic,

enjoy all the exhibits and amenities of the park, then listen to an address by Elder Holland at 8pm.

He had been asked by invitation to share his heritage, his ancestors' stories. One of the first things he said was he was surprised at how many young children were present, that he expected an octogenarian crowd, but pleased to see the young ones there, and hoped that something he could say would be beneficial for them.

CHAPTER AEWS

TEMPLE FORK CHAPTER - Logan, Utah



Senator Lyle Hillyard

At the June meeting, **Senator Lyle Hillyard** reported on some of the important events in the 2017 Utah legislative session.

The daily sessions usually last from 6:00 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. But the legislative session is not just 45 days. Senator Hillyard is on committees that meet regularly during the year. He serves on a screening committee for judges, and any time that the governor is looking for a judge, the committee

has to meet. There are also intermediate meetings called, and he is going to attend one of those soon.

Senator Hillyard has been a member of the Senate for 12 years, and has served under three governors. He has served on the Budget committee, and there is never enough money to do what you want to do. He has also served on the Public Education Committee. About fifty percent of the budget goes to education. This year that amounted to about 300 million dollars.

The Utah Education Association (UEA) fights for the teachers, and they often have disagreements with the legislature. The legislature funds computers to be used in the schools, but they don't feel like the teachers use them effectively. There are many great programs out there, but there is no money to fund them.

Senator Hillyard met with the National Committee of State Legislatures recently. They discussed why foreign countries are doing better at having successful programs for students, when the United States spends more money. They believe that the key is that in these countries no teacher can teach until they have finished their education, and then they have a five-year internship.

There have been many studies done by the State School Board and by the governor. Senator Hillyard doesn't think we need another study. This year they had three recommendations suggested to work on, and hope that they will make a difference.

- 1. KIDS SHOULD BE PREPARED FOR SCHOOL. It is very important what happens in kindergarten through third grade. It is the responsibility of parents to prepare their children. Senator Hillyard is concerned that children today watch too much TV instead of learning basics like colors, etc.
- 2. RETENTION OF TEACHERS. Raising salaries doesn't always result in retention. The money the legislature gives to school districts are allocated by the districts, they can use the money as they choose. In Utah there are very few teachers who are not certified to teach in the area they are hired to fill.
- 3. WHEN KIDS GET THROUGH PUBLIC SCHOOL, MAKE SURE THEY CAN GET A JOB OR GO ON TO COLLEGE. There is concern about the amount of suicide in young people in Utah. There are counseling services available, and a 611 telephone line has been opened where young people can get help. Parents and grandparents need to be more involved in education.

Governor Herbert congratulated the committee on the great job they did for education this year. A resolution congratulating them was given from the UEA, State Board of Education, and the governor's office. A standing ovation was given the Senate by pro-education groups assembled in the Senate Chamber. This rapport between educators and the legislature is very important.

A question was asked concerning funds for education. Senator Hillyard said there were two funds used. One is WPU which is an amount given for every student by the legislature. Kindergarten students and handicapped students get a little extra. The second is Capital, which is given for buildings, computers, etc., and is received from local tax income.

There is a movement now to raise sales tax. However, the true facts are quite different than shows on the surface. As we raise sales taxes, it encourages internet buying. The legislature has tried to get taxes from internet shopping, but are limited in what they can do because of some federal laws that would need to be changed. Also some businesses say they will leave the state if they have to collect sales tax.

There is some talk of taxing services. If this were done it would have the most impact on medical services, and that would raise the cost of medical care.

A question was asked about the school trust money. Senator Hillyard said that the trust money is not public, it belongs to children. A better job has been done of using it since 1990. Today we have 2.2 billion in trust funds. It must

be maintained for our children today and the children in the future.

Senator Hillyard completed his presentation with two thoughts. One of our problems today is that people feel entitled. And the legislature has to work within our state constitution which says Utah must have a balanced budget.

TIMPANOGOS CHAPTER - American Fork, Utah



Sculptor Angela Johnson

July 20, 2017 Chapter Meeting speaker was Angela Johnson. Sister Johnson is the founder/sculptor of "The Light of the World" at Ashton Gardens at Thanksgiving Point in Lehi, Utah.

Before she started sculpting in her late thirties, she had devoted her life to raising her children and pursuing a career as an operatic soprano. She was a member of the faculty at

Brigham Young University's Education Week for eight years. She taught the power of music and various topics centered around the development of gifts and talents. She performed dramatic presentations portraying woman of courage. She is a self-taught sculptor whose mission is to testify of Jesus Christ through her art.

Sister Johnson's presentation centered around six words, which were: remember, freedom, reverence, work, purpose and joy. Each word was expounded upon as it relates to success in life and the fulfilling of eternal values. Her life is a wonderful example of how one comes closer to the Godhead by listening and communicating with the Holy Ghost. In developing a career as an operatic soprano, the spirit whispered to her that she could not accomplish her
