They announced the search for a 10-year-old Princess for this year's celebration as a beginning toward the selection of a queen for the Utah Centennial exposition to be held at Salt Lake City in July 1947.

The general plans for selecting candidates in this long-distance contest embraces the 10 years until the Centennial. For the next few years, the Covered Wagon Days Committee will select a young Princess to occupy the second place honor next to the queen for that year.

This year the Princess will be 10 years old next year she will be 11 and by 1947. All the girls selected over the decade will be 19 years of age. Any Utah born girl may aspire to the Centennial Queenship, provided she has reached her 10th birthday and will not be 11 before July 24 of this year.

Princesses will be disqualified for the Centennial throne for only two reasons: Marriage before July 24, 1947, or becoming involved in any public scandal, the committee has ruled.

Members of our Association, the Sons of Utah Pioneers, organized the Covered Wagon Days Committee, which is the forerunner of our current Days of 47 Committee. Perhaps you feel as I do that this was a unique and fascinating way to pick their Covered Wagon Days royalty. Those little princesses must have had an interesting decade as they grew up anticipating the Centennial in 1947.

I would sincerely hope that you all will take advantage of this month's festivities, and with your children and grandchildren, learn more about the founders of our nation and our pioneer ancestors that have created such a great heritage for each of us.

NEW PRESIDENT ELECT CANDIDATE

Each year we select a new National President Elect. The process is administered by the National Nominating Committee which consists of three members of the National Executive Council, two from the Past President's Council, and an Area Vice President, it is chaired by the immediate Past National President.



Calls for nominations were issued to the SUP membership in April. The Committee met on 23 May, interviewed excellent candidates and selected a nominee to be presented to SUP members attending the Business Meeting at the National Convention in Centerville on September 16. As specified in the Bylaws, a final call will be issued at that meeting for any additional nominations.

The National Nominating Committee selected as this year's nominee, Anthony (Tony) Tidwell, a past president of the Mills Chapter and a current Area Vice President.

Tony has an impressive resume. He has served as a practicing dentist for over 30 years after getting his Doctor of Dental Surgery degree from the University of Tennessee. JOHN PIDDING AND MARGARET LEE JONES

After the exodus from Nauvoo, the Jones family lived in St. Louis. There was a branch of the Church at St. Louis where he and Margaret were active and Margaret sang in the choir and could sing most of the hymns in the Latter-day Saint hymn book. In St. Louis two sons were born to them, Sylvester and Frederick.

After obtaining enough money to buy two yoke of oxen, chains, yokes, and wagons without tires on them, they started to move with the Saints west and traveled to Winter Quarters. John had never driven a yoke of oxen before and it was very difficult for him to manage them. Here he left the dilapidated wagons for his family and bought a small farm planted in wheat and vegetables by some of the Saints and returned to St Louis to earn more money for the trip west.

The winter snows came early and it was necessary for Margaret's two sons to dig under the snow to get turnips and carrots that were still in the ground. There was nothing to dig with but their hands. One day Joseph caught a cold and in a few days was gone. Margaret's troubles seemed more than she could bear. Here she was alone with no way to get word to her husband of the death of their son and no way to bury the boy. A neighbor, Thomas Davenport, came to her rescue. He built a little coffin out of a packing box for her to put her son in and then took it to a burying ground where the Saints had been buried. There they dug a shallow grave in the snow and left her son alone in the wilderness.

When her husband returned they were able to get a wagon with iron tires, two yoke of oxen, a cow and provisions for one year and they left on June 20, 1852 and found the road ahead a very hard one. Every day they longed for the roads of old England. They finally reached Zion just in time for October 1852 conference. Their journey was not over yet. President Young asked them to move with others to the Cedar City area where the iron industry was in process of being developed.

In Cedar they settled in the old fort and lived in the cellar the first year. The iron industry was receiving a great deal of attention and John's services were in demand. While working here the family was very short of the necessities. He naturally thought he would be paid for his work, but this was not the case. These were trying times.

Word came that Johnston's Army was on the way and that stopped the interest in iron products. However John continued in the iron industry and they moved several times finally re-building their log cabin in the present day location of Cedar City.

The Jones family continued to grow until they had seven sons and three daughters. Three sons died when less than three years old. One died in England, one at Winter Quarters and one in Cedar City.

In 1882 John entered into plural marriage by taking a second wife, Fanny Eliza Ridsdale Chapman. John was 63 and Fanny was 22. One daughter was born to them. Margaret had a hard time with this. Every time John would go to Fanny's house for the night Margaret would grieve and confide in her diary: "Oh Lord, be Thou with me. Help me to bear this hardship. Thou art my buckler and my shield. Help me to understand and accept this burden. Forgive me my weakness."

John was arrested and taken to Beaver where he was tried and convicted of cohabitation. Fanny was called as a witness against him and she was prevailed upon to tell the truth.

A few years after John was released from prison he was watching his sons threshing grain. As he returned home at dusk a grandson and his friend came riding up the street at a great speed just as he started to cross the road. His hearing was bad and did not hear them, and when he saw them he tried to get back out of the way but the unmanageable horse ran over him knocking him to the ground and trampling him. John was 71 years old.

When Margaret's beloved John was snatched away so abruptly, her burden was almost more than she could bear. She leaned on her daughters heavily staying with first one and then another. She lived nine and a half years after her husband died, and then was buried next to him in the Cedar City cemetery.

The month's meeting of the Holladay Chapter featured a return engagement of life member, Gale Hammond. Brother Hammond is one of our oldest members in term of years, now age 93, but he is young at heart and is blessed with a remarkable memory. He is still sharp as a tack and has a lot of stories to tell and tells

them well. Gale is a veteran of World War II and spoke of some harrowing experiences when assigned to a front line unit in the Battle of the Bulge.

This meeting he talked about his family history and quoted from five different volumes of history. Especially fascinating was the story of his great grandfather, **Francis Spencer Hammond**, who was converted to the Church in 1847 by members of the Mormon Battalion. Francis was staying at a hotel that was being run by members of the Battalion and heard a discussion going on in the hotel lobby. When he learned they were Mormon missionaries and about the Book of Mormon he set out to prove the Book was

false by using scriptures from the Bible. The missionaries answered every challenge but Francis decided that proved the Bible was wrong (instead of the Book of Mormon was true!) and lost faith in Christianity.

He later had several visions and left mining gold in order to join the Church. He came to Utah in 1848. After arrival he went to church and heard a young lady bear her testimony. After the meeting he went to her home and told her he was impressed with her testimony and proposed marriage on the spot. He told her he would give her time to think about it and come back another time to see what she had decided. When he left the girl's mother said, "I think you should marry that young man." Spencer returned ONE HOUR later and she accepted. They were married the following week. That has to be one of the shortest "courtships" in history (except for Adam and Eve's). Grandfather Hammond became the first Bishop of the Huntsville Ward and, in the capacity confirmed David O MacKay (since his father was serving a mission at the time).

HURRICANE VALLEY CHAPTER - Hurricane, Utah

MAY'S TREK: On the 29th of May we gathered at the Zion's Bank parking lot, and headed to Springdale, and then on to Shunesburg. We had the largest gathering for a trek that we have had in a long time. For many, it was a once in a lifetime experience, and it was wonderful to wander around the area that once was the home of some of our Ancestors.

There was really not much that has survived the ravages of time, but

the one home still stands as a monument to their dedication to life, and their religion! There is a small graveyard there, and a modern tombstone depicting the names of those who spent their lives there.

JUNES' EVENT: We gathered at the Legion Hall to have a luscious dinner, to socialize with each other, and to listen to a marvelous presentation on the History of the Hirschi's in Hurricane and the surrounding area. Our presenter was Paula Hirschi Arriola. She was well prepared, as she told of their family's history since 1802 to the present. It all started when Ulrich Hirschi and his family joined the Mormon Church in 1858. He had a son named Gottlieb, who was the first to migrate to Zion. He was called to settle the Santa Clara area, and a couple of years, moved to Rockville. They had several children, the 6th of whom was named David.

Most of the story was centered on **David Hirschi** and the tremendous value he provided to the Saints, as a teacher, and a cattleman. He was the first to begin experimenting with dry farming in the area. Perhaps the most important thing he did was open the State Bank of Hurricane, and preserved it even throughout the depression, making it one of the few banks to survive that trying time. That story alone is worth the reading of the history that has been posted on the Pioneer stories on the www.hvsup.org web page.

The story goes from David to Claudius (Claud), who continued to provide the same stalwart representation of the Hirschi family in the Washington county area as David, and to Waldo, who is at the present time doing the same. Waldo, one of the oldest citizens in our community was at the presentation.

JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE CHAPTER - South Jordan, Utah

Our visit on 27 May to the Sanpete County communities of Spring City and Ephraim was truly a delightful experience. The homes and other buildings of Spring City were not only interesting to see, but a monument to the determination of the English and Danish settlers who built them. Our chapter trek committee, **Mike Poulos, Richard Ferguson, and Bob Beecher** did an outstanding job of investigating the sites to visit, getting historical information on each area and organizing the itinerary. They even included a breakfast apple fritter for our refreshment along the way.

We were invited to enjoy a music recital by international opera star and renowned cellist **Brian Stucki**, This recital was a highlight for me in the wonderful acoustics of the Spring City Chapel. Brian (also a professor) not only has a tenor voice of both power and nuance but also, played the piano while singing! His notes were clean, high, and bright. He has a vast repertoire of concert and opera roles and is known for his complete mastery of dynamics and vocal shading. "Homeward Bound" and his final number, "Bring Him Home" from Les Miserable was pure beauty and I choked back a sob on his final and clear, high B note.

According to his bio, this father of three grows a yearly crop of over 400 lbs. of tomatoes in his back yard. Oh yeah, and he is a bee-keeper!

Spring City is listed on the National Registry of Historic Places and is recognized as a well-preserved example of a Mormon Settlement! After the performance of Brian, I toured other historic sites in the immediate area including, but not limited to, the local Arts Gallery, the old Spring City schoolhouse, (newly restored and dedicated just yesterday) and the DUP Museum. I also went into the Jock Jones, handmade Windsor Chairs workshop. I admired his craftsmanship. As a bit of history: When the Danish and English settlers arrived, they settled at opposite ends of the town because there was a dislike for each other's countries extending back for many generations. They were unified only for mutual protection from raiding attacks by Native Americans. The Danes built their log homes with the logs in the vertical position, while the English built theirs in the horizontal position. There are Oolite quarries nearby and this form of limestone was the basic material for many of the buildings including the Chapel. There are many historic homes including the Orson Hyde home.

From Spring City we traveled a short distance to Ephraim and the Scandinavian Festival, where we enjoyed large venues of the many Scandinavian food booths, music, and crafts. We enjoyed the other activities and sites including a quilt show, car show, and historic sites/bus tour, just to name a few.

Maple Mountain Chapter, June 16, 2017. We were excited to have as our June dinner meeting speakers our own chapter members, **Brent and Laurie Whiting**. They shared with us experiences with their family in working to help people in Central and South America and West Africa obtain education and learn skills to help them move out of poverty.

After Brent served a LDS mission to Ecuador, he felt a strong desire to find ways to help these wonderful people again. In 1996, he and his wife, Laurie, moved to Panama on their own with their family of 4 young children, to work with a small, struggling branch of the LDS church. They were there for eight months and were instrumental in revitalizing the branch. Their children were home-schooled, but learned much about a different culture.

The Whiting family later was contacted by mission presidents and did the same thing in Chile and Guatemala. They explained to us how these visits began a connection with the humble people of Latin American that changed the course of their lives. Since that time, their family has grown and so have their experiences in Latin America, ultimately leading to the creation of an organization called **Yuda Bands**.

Brent and Laurie shared with us how through a unique fundraising model that sells Guatemalan homemade Yuda wristbands through youth groups at high schools throughout America, they have raised funds to support the education of hundreds of students in Guatemala and Zimbabwe. Most of the smaller villages in these countries have no public education and only through private schools can children obtain the skills they need.

Their program also helps prepare these students to break out of poverty by helping them learn skills such as goal setting, budgeting and giving service to others. We were touched by the demonstration of love and charity that this family experienced, and made us all realize how the principles taught by the gospel of Jesus Christ are a recipe for change, growth, and success both spiritually and temporally. In 2013, Brent and Laurie were awarded BYU's Service to Family Alumni Award for their work with Yuda Bands.

For five years **George Potter**, **Richard Wellington**, **Tim Sedor** and their friends from Fiji, Germany, New Zealand, the Philippines Islands, the United Kingdom and the United States have traveled almost 100,000 miles searching for the Lehi-Nephi trail in Saudi Arabia.

George updated us on their continuing quest to find and document the geography, ancient trade routes, and circumstances as they would have been in 600 B.C., and the then existing peoples and their culture and skills which would have made possible all that transpired as recorded by

Nephi in the Book of Mormon record. The information shared is truly appreciated. Thank you, George, for an engaging evening.

George will be retiring soon, and has only about a year remaining in Saudi Arabia, following which he will move back to Utah, but we trust will continue to uncover new information about Lehi's trail. We were reminded that this all came to be because by being employed in Saudi Arabia, and making acquaintances with other LDS church members, and because they had a yen for adventure, they began this quest many years ago and gradually uncovered the information they now present.

As you will see, the quality bar has been significantly raised for Book of Mormon research in the Old World. The new findings are compelling and well documented. As we already know through the exercise of our faith, the Book of Mormon is the word of God. For the first time, you can see that it also includes a very accurate record of a journey through Arabia in 597 B.C..

The fruit of these efforts is what inspired Tim and George to establish the Nephi Project, an organization dedicated to presenting their discoveries and to raise money to continue research projects on the books of 1st and 2nd Nephi. A series of books, and DVDs have been produced to bring these amazing discoveries to you and your friends.

SETTLEMENT CANYON CHAPTER - Tooele, Utah

Names such as Hudspeth, Jedediah Smith, Bartleson, Bidwell, Freemont, Stansbury and Hastings left their imprint on the Grantsville area before names like Donner, Reed and The Mormons became better known than their earlier predecessors who paved the way for them. Indeed, Grantsville was first call "Twenty Wells" by these earlier travelers because of the abundance of water found there before the dry, deadly and disheartening march across the salt desert to the next water found at Pilot Peak out by modern day Wendover.

Newly elected president of the Twenty Wells Chapter of the Sons of Utah Pioneers and Local Grantsville historian Craig Anderson told those in attendance at the June 1 dinner and educational history night of the Settlement Canyon Chapter of the Sons of Utah Pioneers about the hardships faced and conquered by these first white European travelers into these before unknown areas. Local Native American Indian tribes barely scraped by in this foreboding landscape, but still had time to record their history in pictographs and petroglyphs of which Anderson had photos of in abundance. He also explained about the pit houses and primitive tools made by these creative peoples, and how their cultural and spiritual factors differed from these later travelers and settlers who would in essence drive them even further into the wilderness. The effect on this writer and those present was to desire to visit and learn more of these earliest known settlers of Tooele County.

If one knows where to look, and Anderson has spent a life time searching and studying this early local history, there is truly an abundance of evidence of this life style right in our own back yards. On Saturday June 24th, Anderson and others will lead a Sons of Utah Pioneers trek into some of the very places where he discovered these artifacts, especially in our own West Desert. He will also visit little remembered old mining claims as well as natural formations. Anderson strongly advises to not try accessing these kinds of places without plenty of water, and spare tires for your high clearance vehicle. A camera would be a good item to take, as it is now against federal law to remove any aspects of Native American cultures.

It is interesting to note that most of these early explorers into the Great Salt Lake Valley accessed it via the Weber River drainage with all its narrows and rapids. The well-known Donner/Reed wagon train elected to hack their way up to Big Mountain, down Immigration Canyon and exhaust their teams making a road up and over the obstacle at the mouth

of Immigration Canyon by modern day "This is the Place State Park." This would cost them days and days of resting their animals before making their trip around the southern end of the Great Salt Lake to modern day Grantsville where once again they rested and watered their teams before that final, fatal, foray into the desert. Some of their wagon tracks can still be seen all these years later. Because of this Donner/ Reed decision and trail breaking, the first Mormon Pioneers of 1847 saved countless days and exhaustion entering what would become the new home of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

TEMPLE FORK CHAPTER - Logan, Utah



Dr. Berrett

The speaker for the May meeting was **Dr. Berrett**. He talked about the history of the LDS Church in the Holy Land. He gave four reasons why the country of Israel is a Holy Land.

- Because of the promises made to Abraham.
- It is the historical promised land of the House of Israel.
- Jesus was born, lived and taught, established His Church, was sacrificed and resurrected there.
- It is holy to three religions: Christian, Islam, and Judaism.

The Holy Land has been important to the LDS Church since the very beginning of the Restoration, and Joseph Smith was given revelation and keys to bring to pass the gathering of the Jews to the Holy Land and related things that had to occur prior to the Second Coming of Jesus. In 1843 Joseph Smith said that Judah would return to the Holy Land, Jerusalem would be rebuilt, and a temple would be built there before Jesus Christ came again.

The Holy Land was first dedicated for the returning of the Jews by Orson Hyde on October 24, 1841. His dedicatory prayer was received by revelation. There were eight additional dedications, at various locations in the Holy Land, by Latter-day Saint apostles in the following 92 years:

Orson Hyde – Oct. 24, 1841 – Mount of Olives

George A. Smith – March 2, 1873 – Mount of Olives

Lorenzo Snow – March 2, 1873 – Mount of Olives

Ferdinand Hintze – May 8, 1898 – Mount of Olives

Francis M. Lyman – March 4, 1902 – Mount of Olives

Francis M. Lyman – March 16, 1902 – Mt. Carmel (Haifa)

James E. Talmage – Oct. 18, 1927 – Mt. Carmel (Haifa)

John A. Widtsoe – May 31, 1933 – Mt. Carmel (Haifa)

John A. Widtsoe - May 31, 1933 - Mount of Olives

Jacob Spori was sent to open the Constantinople Mission in 1884. A few months later he was transfer to Haifa being the first missionary in the Holy Land. The Holy Land has since been part of the following missions: Turkish, Armenian, Palestine-Syrian, Swiss, and now the International.

In 1965, the BYU Study Abroad Program opened study programs in the Holy Land. Although there was much opposition from Hasidic (ultra-orthodox) Jewish Groups, a building was finally approved to house the study programs. It is called the BYU Jerusalem Center for Near Eastern Study. The building, which was completed in March 1988, has many arches and windows to let in light. It has eight levels descending down the face of the hill. It has a marvelous organ which cost about a million dollars, donated by an unknown benefactor.

President Hinckley once said: "The building is far more than just a place to teach some classes. The Lord wanted a 'presence' in the Holy Land, and the Church really has a presence there. Thousands of the people are very much aware of the Mormon Church."

At the suggestion of President Harold B. Lee, a million dollars was raised by the Orson Hyde Foundation, to construct the Orson Hyde Memorial Park. It was built on a hill overlooking Jerusalem. The Park, dedicated on 24 October 1979, is a fitting tribute to Elder Hyde and an appropriate gift to the city of Jerusalem. It is a place of quiet meditation for Christian, Moslem, and Jew alike.

TIMPANOGOS CHAPTER - American Fork, Utah

The June 15, 2017 Chapter meeting speakers were Bill and Karen Morgan from American Fork, Utah. Bill's presentation "Histories concerned of Utah Valley Pioneers from 1847 to 1869". Bill and Karen been have working with the American Fork Daughters of **Pioneers** Museum. The project was to

digitize 19 bound volumes containing 1100 biographies of early residents of American Fork.

Bill and Karen scanned 4500 pages of history. The original pages were not searchable so Bill organized volunteers to transcribe all of the histories into searchable documents. Now the museum will use this collection in an in-house Research Center that will be open on July 24th. The 19 hardback volumes were collected by the members of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers who lived in American Fork between 1921 and 1968.

The DUP members are organized into groups they call Camps. The first Camp of DUP members in American Fork was named the Adams Camp. As the membership grew other Camps were created such as the American Fork Camp, the Greenwood Camp and the Beehive Camp.

Bill began by discussing the biography of Arza Adams that was developed by the Adams Camp. Arza was described as a man with a "Tigerish Disposition". Bill told a story about Arza and 15 other youth who were being chased by a mob of at least 200 anti-Mormons. When the boys decided to stand their ground in a grove of trees, the mob ceased chasing them. Years later Arza was told by one of the members of the mob that they felt they were being led into a trap of hundreds of armed Mormons and hence ceased pursuing.

While living in Millcreek, Utah, Arza was on his way to Provo to trade with the Indians, they camped on American Fork Creek. Nathan Adams, son of Arza, as he walked around, taking in the surroundings, said, "This would make a wonderful place for a settlement and I would like to live here". Arza and other pioneers got permission from Brigham Young to settle in American Fork.


Bill pointed out that the 1100 biographies are now able to be searched by topics of Missionary (Parley p. Pratt), Boat and Year (Thornton, 1856), Route (Liverpool to New York or New Orleans), Wagon train or handcart Captain (Willey) and Occupation (farmer, blacksmith, teacher, Indian fighter). Some locality histories include: American Fork Banking, American Fork Railroad and Depot, Timber Day and Forest City, Grant's Emporium, Settlement of Highland and the Tyng mine in American Fork Canyon. Bill discussed a number of prominent pioneer families who settled in the area.

Bill and Karen then performed a delightful skit entitled "Mary Greets the Bishop", which was concerning the unique circumstances leading up to the marriage of Mary Bathgate to James Boyer Shelley.

Karen Morgan then discussed the importance of each of us keeping and telling stories of our families. She discussed the value of stories in keeping families together and strong. Quoting from Bruce Feller in "The Stories that Bind Us", she related that, "If you want a happier family ... retell the story of your family's positive moments and your ability to bounce back from the difficult ones. That act alone may increase the odds that your family will thrive for many generations".

Karen said that, "In a sense, your story becomes scripture for many generations to come". Quoting a West African saying, she said, "If a person dies without his or her story being retold, it's as if a library has burned down". Again quoting Bruce Feller, Karen related that, "Teenagers with a healthy knowledge of family stories have a strong sense of identity, a strong appreciation for forebears, showed more resilience in hardship and had stories of ancestors' lives that gave them a beacon when they were in difficult times themselves".
