#### **PIONEER DAY 1936**

What was Pioneer day like 87 years ago? How did they celebrate then? Some things were different and surprisingly some of the traditions are much the same. One difference is that events of the week of July 22 to 24th were called "Covered Wagon Days" back then. Here is list of those events:

**RODEO** - Wednesday, July 22, 1936 at noon was the official opening of the "Covered Wagon Days" celebration. The activities of the day included a parade of rodeo cowboys, cowgirls,

trick riders, clowns and Indians. The event also included the official opening of the World Congress of Rough Riders. Three full days of rodeo activities took place that year.

SUNRISE SERVICE - On Thursday morning, At 6:30 A.M. July 23, 1936, a Sunrise Service was observed at the site of the PROPOSED "This is the Place Monument". Bleachers were set up facing east and David O. McKay addressed the gathering. During his remarks, two men on horses came riding in from Emigration Canyon. They pantomimed the enactment of seeing the valley below them and then rode off. Nine more men on horseback appeared, followed by Brigham Young in a covered wagon leading a caravan of twenty more wagons! The entire company rolled in while a combined chorus sang "COME COME YE SAINTS". President McKay, then a member of the First Presidency, narrated the event and told of tentative plans for a Centennial Celebration to be held in 1947 at which time a monument would be built and unveiled at that spot.

**PROCESSION** - The Executive Committee then led the procession down The Old Pioneer Trail (then Broadway St.) arriving at 3rd South and State Street where a brief ceremony was held and a marker was placed to commemorate the first tilling of the soil in the Salt Lake Valley.

MONUMENT UNVEILING - From there the procession continued to the corner of Main and South Temple where another monument was unveiled in honor of Mr. <u>C.R.</u> <u>Savage</u>, founder of "Old Folks Day". The monument was a drinking fountain!



RADIO BROADCAST - A radio broadcast was held from 8:30 A.M to 9:00 A.M originating from the Tabernacle. It featured the music of the Singing Mothers of the National Women's Relief Society along with music by the Temple Quartet, a mixed double quartet (you can listen to them HERE). Brother Richard L. Evans, then director of KSL Public Events, was the announcer. His remarks included historic narration and descriptions of the progress of the caravan interspersed with tributes to the pioneers.

PIONEER PARADE - On Friday, July 24, 1936 the Pioneer Parade assembled at the intersection of South Temple and Main Street. The line then marched south on Main Street to 7th South, turned east to State Street, then proceeded North to Second South and then east to Third East to disband. The parade was divided up into 4 divisions and included veterans of the Spanish-American War and World War I.

CAVALCADE - At 9 P.M. on July 24th, a presentation of the Utah Cavalcade was held and open to ticket holders. The event featured 80 musicians, 150 dancers, and choruses of 450 voices. John Charles Thomas, a 45-year old distinguished American Baritone of that era who was at the height of his career, was the featured performer. A portrayal of the coming of Father Escalante to the Salt Lake Valley in 1776 followed by his band of Indian followers was offered. A proclamation of "Her Majesty, Utah" was given and Indians dressed in ceremonial clothing performed dances for the audience. At 12 Midnight the celebration was officially closed with the performance of "The Star-Spangled Banner"

While much has changed since 1936, one thing remains true to this day: Pioneer Day is all about celebration, having fun and honoring our loved pioneers.








At Lincoln's New Salem State Historical Site about 2 miles South of Petersburg and about 20 miles Northwest of Springfield, in Menard County, Illinois stands a larger-than-life statue of Abraham Lincoln. The statue depicts Lincoln at the critical period of his life when he discarded the axe of the frontiersman and turned to the study of law. It is at the "Hilltop" entrance to the reconstructed village where Abraham Lincoln spent his early adulthood.

Dr. Avard Tennyson Fairbanks was the sculptor for this larger-than-life bronze statue, which became known as "Abraham Lincoln, Frontiersman" and was a gift to Illinois by the SUP (site #E) in 1954. The likeness of the statue was also chosen for use on the commemorative Illinois state quarter. Fairbanks' original Lincoln statue is displayed in the Fairview, Utah Museum of History and Art, 55 North 100 East, Fairview, Utah. (https://fairviewmuseum.org/index.php)

#### BOX ELDER CHAPTER - Brigham City, Utah

Darren Parry spoke to the Box Elder Chapter at their June picnic dinner in Brigham City. Parry has been an unselfish and outspoken servant of his people, the Northern Shoshone, who were the primary inhabitants of northern Utah before Europeans came to settle. He is a direct descendant of Chief Washakie, many of whose people were massacred by US Cavalry near Preston, Idaho, in the winter of 1863. Darren has chosen the difficult responsibility to teach the history of his people's mistreatment by the new settlers, while at the same time being an active member of the Church of Jesus

Christ of Latter-day Saints, whose pioneer ancestors often ignored, misunderstood, or even committed some of the tragedies experienced by Native Americans. Parry has successfully raised funds for the tribe's quest to build a learning center on the land where the Bear River Massacre took place, at that time known as the village of Boa Ogoi. The land was acquired by the tribe in recent years and is naturally considered a sacred place because of the many Shoshone men, women, and children whose lives were violently taken there.

### CEDAR CITY CHAPTER - Cedar City, Utah

For our activity in June, our chapter supported efforts to raise funds to renovate the Old Rock Church in Parowan. During Old Rock Church Days in Parowan on June 16-17 a number of activities were supported by our chapter. They included a quilt show, a barbecue dinner, a pioneer program featuring award winning director TC Christensen who is just completing production of a new film Alma Richards: Raising the Bar, and a silent auction of many donated items and services. Pioneer games and many other activities to raise funds for the renovation were conducted in the adjacent park on Saturday.

This historic building is one of the oldest remaining meetinghouses in Utah. Construction began in 1861 and wasn't completed until 1867. After its completion, the Rock Church served as a meetinghouse for members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, a town meeting place, a community recreation center, the first Latter-day Saint seminary in Parowan, a schoolhouse, a dance hall, and for a time it housed the Parowan State Academy and Parowan High School.

**UPCOMING IN JULY** is our town meeting in the Rock Church in Cedar City on the 24th where we will honor our modern-day pioneers and essay contest winners.

A monument was unveiled and dedicated to honor Levi Savage May 17, 2023. The monument was spearheaded by Cotton Mission chapter member Rex Jensen with support by the Cotton Mission Chapter. The monument is located in front of the Toquerville town hall. It includes a bronze

bust of Levi Savage, four bas reliefs, and three bronze plaques outlining Levi's life and service to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and to the Southern Utah area. The plaque records the contribution of the Cotton Mission chapter.

The Cotton Mission Chapter also held a wonderful trek to the Minersville area on June 10 which included visiting the Union Pacific Railroad station in Milford as well as tours of the old Milford hotels. After eating, we moved into the chapel to listen to Derral Eves keep us spell bound as he told us about his involvement with the movie series "The Chosen." He talked about the difficulties that were encountered just because of some people from other Christian Faiths who didn't want anything to do with it because a "Mormon" was involved. He talked about times he was invited to speak to groups where people would leave when they found out who he was, and getting to the point that he had overcome those challenges and people come in great numbers to listen to him. He told us what a good man the producer of "The Chosen" was, and his dedication to being as scripturally accurate as possible, but telling the Savior's story putting Him in a setting as realistic to His time on earth as possible. Our time with Derral was Amazing. Derral was made one of our Modern Day Pioneers.

JUNE'S ACTIVITIES: On the 10th we made a trek to Bundyville and learned of the history of that community and the school house that still stands there. It is in its 3rd evolution. A few years after it was built it became too small and was rebuilt to accommodate the growth. That building stood until the 1960's when it was burned to the ground by vandals, and has since been rebuilt. Today it serves as a reminder of what was, housing a small museum with pictures and artifacts to aid in that reminder. David Hinton and David Isom presented short histories. We then proceeded up to Mount Trumbull and Nixon Springs where we viewed several monuments and had lunch. Getting there we were blessed to pass through a cattle drive, which was an added attraction.

ON THE 28TH we will meet to honor one of our own as a modern-day pioneer. We will meet at the Legion Hall, and the dinner will be pot-luck. It will begin at 6:30, our usual time.

#### JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE CHAPTER - South Jordan, Utah

Our speaker on this evening was David Rencher. He is pictured with his wife Tamara Rencher. His subject matter was "Family Search Resources." David Rencher is the Chief Genealogical Officer, Family Search for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He has worked in genealogical roles for the Church for over 40 years. Family Search is the largest genealogical research tool in the world and is maintained by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Genealogy research began in the Church in 1894. In 1938 microfilm use was introduced. In 1984 Personal Ancestral File started. In 1998 digital cameras were introduced. And in 1994 Family Search started. Microfilm digitization began in 2004. There were over

two million rolls of microfilm that had to be digitized at that time. Mobile apps began being introduced in 2014. In 2017 collecting of African oral genealogies started. Family Search currently has over 3,300 record collections with 13.3 billion searchable names plus images available. The Church provides webinars for learning genealogical research and other tools and resources without charge to the public.

We are grateful to David for the wonderful information presented to us that teaches us of the progress that has been made to research our family names, histories, and ultimately perform their sacred temple ordinances when applicable.

#### LEHI CHAPTER - Lehi, Utah

#### MAPLE MOUNTAIN CHAPTER - Mapleton / Spanish Fork, Utah

MAY MEETING: Brent and Lori Whiting from Mapleton were our speakers for our meeting in May. Their income from rental properties allowed them to go earlier in their lives with their children to perform service missions. They went to countries in Central and South America and in Africa connecting with Saints in branches in those countries to serve them in ways that they were inspired to do. But most of their presentation was on when they were called as mission president and companion to go to Africa again. This time they served in the countries of Zambia and Malawi. There were some locations in their mission where the Church had not been established and there were many people waiting to be baptized. One man by the name of Weston was an early organizer. When under the direction of President Whiting a branch was established and 54 people were baptized. Later that number came up to 90. They were serving their mission when Covid 19 struck the world. Some missionaries under their direction could not leave because their countries, including the Pacific Islands, were not allowing people to

come into their countries. One missionary from Tonga served for three and half years. But things got better. The Whiting's presentation was an inspiration to all of us as they witnessed once again of the Church's dynamic growth in Africa.

JUNE MEETING: Our speaker for the month of June was Jim Hamilton who is a member of our Maple Mountain Chapter. He shared with us a little known account from early history of how two young men helped protect the life of the prophet Joseph Smith. One of these young men was the great-great grandfather of Brother Hamilton. William Law had been a member of the Counsel of the Twelve but had been excommunicated from the Church. Now he gathered together a group of men who also had been excommunicated who plotted to kill the Prophet. Those two young men, with last names of Scott (a great-great grandfather of Brother Hamilton) and Harris (who was connected to Martin Harris) were also invited to the meeting with a belief that

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they too were not in favor of the Prophet. The first meeting was followed by two other meetings which the two young men were invited to. After each meeting the two young men met with the Prophet to let him know what the group was planning to do. In the last meeting there was an invitation to kill the Prophet. All made a covenant, sworn under the contents of the Bible, to do so, accept the two young men.

They were told they would be killed if they didn't agree. But somehow they were able to escape and headed for the river where in hiding they again connected with the Prophet. At that point Joseph Smith said that his life wouldn't last long. And yes we know the rest of the story of how his life was taken soon after in the Carthage Jail.

The trek ended with a delightful barbecue at the vacation home of the Parry family located in West Bear Lake.

#### SETTLEMENT CANYON CHAPTER - Tooele, Utah

At the June 1 dinner meeting Gerrit J. Dirkmaat spoke to us. Gerrit is an associate professor of Church history and doctrine at Brigham Young University. He received his PhD from the University of Colorado in 2010, where he studied nineteenth-century American expansionism and foreign relations. His dissertation was titled "Enemies Foreign and Domestic: US Relations with Mormons in the US Empire in North America, 1844–1854." He worked as a historian and writer for the Church History Department from 2010 to 2014 with the Joseph Smith Papers Project and served

as a volume coeditor/historian for Documents volume 1, the lead volume editor on Documents volume 3, and has continued to work as a volunteer editor for the Joseph Smith Papers project on Administrative Records, Council of Fifty, Minutes, March 1844–January 1846 and Documents volume 8. He is the coauthor, along with Michael Hubbard MacKay, of the award-winning book From Darkness unto Light: Joseph Smith's Translation and Publication of the Book of Mormon, published by the BYU Religious Studies Center and Deseret Book.
